New This Year, Junior High Gifted and Enrichment Program

I am excited to inform you of a new program starting at Lakeview Junior High. This year during 2^{nd} and 3^{rd} quarter our Junior High students are getting the opportunity to sign up for a gifted program or an enrichment program they would like to participate in. Participation is voluntary and students will sign up at the end of their first quarter. This year we are offering two different programs the gifted program and the enrichment program.

The <u>gifted programs</u> are the programs that are set aside for students who qualify. In order to qualify for the gifted programs, stu-

dents must meet one of the following criteria: score a 94% or higher on their latest standardized test score, which is the ITBS test or earn a 94% or higher GPA during their first quarter grades. If students meet these criteria they have the opportunity to participate in the gifted program they sign up for during 2nd and 3rd quarter. The gifted programs that we are offering this year are *Math Counts*, *NE Jr. Science Academy*, or the *National History Day* program.

The <u>enrichment programs</u> are being offered for students who apply and are accepted

We have been busy in the library with many new books, including the 2011-2012 Golden Sower nominees. We received the ten intermediate and ten young adult titles. I can honestly say, there isn't a clunker in the bunch. I have thoroughly enjoyed them all and do not envy the students as they begin to consider which title they will vote for in the spring.

It's also exciting to announce the library is sponsoring the Viking.O newscast each week with a booktrailer video. The fifth and sixth grade students have challenged me to read 200 books by the end of 2011. I have currently read 158 books. I am tracking

my progress on the library website.

This week I began a two week unit with the English 10 students on research fundamentals. I have given this process a great deal of thought as I plan for this unit. We will spend our time looking at how we access information and how we evaluate it. One of the things I told the students was that I was very passionate about helping them to not only find what they need, but helping them understand what to do with it and how to make all this stuff work for us in a meaningful way. I want them to not be afraid to try and to be willing to learn, always. Part of that process is modeling the use of technology and skills, and having the

attitude that learning is ongoing. It's not the destination — it's the journey that matters.

One of the librarians that I follow on Twitter recently posted the following on her blog, "We need to model the right attitude towards learning --not, "I don't know how to do this, you do it for me," but, "I don't know how to do this, can you show me how?" If what we're teaching by our model is helplessness, we can't be surprised when that's what our students have learned. But if instead we model that it's okay not to know, but not okay to not want to know, we create an environment in which all kinds of learning are possible."

Christ Lutheran School visits Orphan Grain Train



The first quarter chapel offering at Christ Lutheran School was Orphan Grain Train. On Oct. 7 a representative from them came an did chapel for the school.

On Oct. 10 the K-8

students went to Norfolk to Mercy Meals. They packed rice into bags, added seasonings, sealed and labeled the bags for 2400 meals. The meals will go to starving people in Kenya. They also decorated the boxes the rice will be packed in for shipment. The students also saw a video and toured Orphan Grain Train. They ship the meals for Mercy Meals. Then, on Oct. 14, the students made 6 scrub buckets for Orphan Grain Train. These buckets are sent to areas of disaster that need cleaning and various supplies. The students enjoyed doing the service projects and helping others in need.



Students participate in Project Wild

The students participated in a learning experience through the Nebraska Parks Department called Project Wild. Jamie Bachman came to our school and led the students in a variety of activities.

The K-1-2 students learned about different kinds of animals and their habitats. They were fascinated with the skulls and animal skins that they were able to touch. They also learned which animals are native to Nebraska. The 3-4-5 students learned about inherited characteristics through Project Wild. Jamie taught the students about how the type of beak, legs, and feet a bird has are inherited characteristics. They are also very important to its survival. The students were able to see different stuffed birds and what their inherited characteristics are.

The final activity was for the 6-7-8 students. They did an experiment that showed them how run-off water can remove the top soil from a field. They saw the difference between run-off water with just soil, mulch added to it and roots in the soil. The water went from muddy to clear. The kids were amazed at how the water appeared differently depending on what was on the soil. They found that 1 inch of top soil is replaced every 500 years.



College may still seem far off, but admission deadlines will start hitting this fall. Follow these steps to stay on track:

Contact your top colleges NOW and ask about deadlines and the process for applying for admission, college-based scholarships and financial aid. Most of this information can be found on the college website.

Apply to your top 3-4 colleges before the deadline. Along with your application, the colleges will require your high school transcript, class rank, GPA and ACT/SAT score. They may also request a list of your extracurricular activities, letters of recommendation, an essay, and an interview.

Update your *Activities Resume*. Because extracurricular activities are an important part of the admissions application, keep them up-to-date by using the <u>Activities Resume</u> at EducationQuest.org.

Contact your admissions representative periodically to stay informed about deadlines and campus activities.

Attend a Financial Aid Program to learn college funding options

Juniors and seniors - to learn about financial aid and other college funding options, attend an upcoming EducationQuest Financial Aid Program with your parents or an adult who can help you with college planning. Find dates and locations in the Upcoming Events section at EducationQuest.org.

JUNIOPS . . start researching colleges

If you can narrow your choices by the end of your junior year, your senior year will be less stressful. Here's how to get started:

Review <u>College Profiles</u> at EducationQuest.org for information about colleges in Nebraska and across the country. If you're interested in going to an out-of-state school, check out the Midwest Student Exchange Program at http://msep.mhec.org.

Meet with college representatives who visit your school, and then visit the websites of the colleges that interest you to learn more about the schools.

Once you've narrowed your choices, schedule campus visits. Try to visit in the spring of your junior year while colleges are still in session.
