STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

The State of the Schools Report just became public. You can access it by going to the Lakeview web page, going under district to school improvement and then clicking on the link to the report. You can also access this report by going to the Nebraska Department of Education web page.

This year there is a new report called NePAS. This report ranks the schools from 1 to 248 in most categories. You will need to take a look at this report as it is a state ranking of schools on test scores, improvement and growth.

As I mentioned in my article last year there are many acronyms in education and in the area of student achievement this tradition continues. We have NCLB (No Child Left Behind), AYP (annual yearly progress) and PLAS (persistently low achieving school) relating to this article.

NCLB is a federal mandate that will have all students become proficient in the areas of reading and math by the year 2014. While school districts are working toward this final goal of having 100% of their students proficient, there have been yearly measurements that a district has needed to meet to

Lakeview Accreditation Visit

In Nebraska, all public schools must meet the requirements of Rule 10 if they want to be an accredited school district. Rule 10 laws are the rules, regulations and procedures required by accredited school districts.

As a part of the accreditation process every five years schools are required to host an external accreditation visit. During the accreditation visit an external team investigates, studies, interviews and analyzes our school system and school improvement processes. Lakeview Community Schools is scheduled to host our accreditation visit March 18-20, of this school year. During the visit the external team will assess and grade the Lakeview school

system based on how we are performing on the following 5 standards.

- Purpose and Direction: The school maintains and communicates a purpose and direction that commits to high expectations for learning as well as shared values and beliefs about teaching and learning.
- 2. Governance and Leadership: The school operates under governance and leadership that promotes and supports student performance and school effectiveness.
- 3. <u>Teaching and Assessing for Learning:</u> The school's curriculum, instructional design, and assessment practices guide and ensure teacher effectiveness and student learning.

be determined as making AYP. This is true for all students and for all sub-groups (male, female, ESL, sped, etc.). If you have at least 30 students in each subgroup, then their score would help to determine if your school made AYP.

As the information was just released, the staff will first take a close look at the results and decide on a plan of action to improve our student performance. More information on the test scores, how we preformed on the test and our plan of action to improve will be discussed in future newsletters.

- Resources and Support Systems: The school has resources and provides services that support its purpose and direction to ensure success for all students.
- Using Results for Continuous Improvement: The school implements a comprehensive assessment system that generates a range of data about student learning and school effectiveness and uses the results to guide continuous improvement.

After the external visit the external team will then provide a written report which grades Lakeview Community Schools on each of the above standards. The external report

will also provide us feedback on the strengths and weaknesses of the district. The accreditation process is an excellent way to receive feedback and expertise on areas that we are doing well in and areas that we need to improve upon. Throughout this year our school improvement steering committee and staff are preparing for the visit.

New Procedure for Junior High Missing Assignments:

Often times we see our Junior High student's grades decline because they are not getting their assignments turned in on time. Sometimes these students are not handing in assignments because they struggle with organization, sometimes it is due to motivation and other times it is due to the distractions of the physical, emotional and social changes of their adolescent growth.

Regardless of the reason, if teachers and parents work together to help our Junior High kids learn the importance of turning in assignments on time the more successful our students are going to be in school and in life. Therefore we are implementing a new communication strategy at Lakeview Junior High so we can communicate with parents in a more timely manner about their son or daughter's missing assignments. The following is a description of the new procedure:

The first step of the procedure:

When your son/daughter does not turn in an assignment their teacher is going to send home with your child a "Missing Assignment" note, on the day they did not turn in their assignment. Your child is expected to bring the note home to you. Parents, we want you to please sign the note and return the note to school with your child the next day. This way the teacher knows you, the parent, have seen the

note and we know your child has brought his "missing assignment" to your attention.

The second step of the procedure:

Anticipating that some Junior High students may forget or not bring the "missing assignment" note to your attention, we have provided another means of communicating the missing assignment. On the day the student receives a "missing assignment" note, an automated phone call message from Lakeview Junior High will be sent to the parents of those students who did not turn in their assignment for that day. The automated phone call message will communicate the following:

Dear Lakeview Junior High Parent:

"Your son or daughter will be bringing home a note today, indicating that he or she did not turn in their assignment. Please visit with your child about turning in the assignment and talk with them about the importance of turning in assignments on time. If you have any questions please contact the school. Thank you."

We hope this means of communication will help our students and your child become more successful in school. Working together we can make a difference! Thank you for your support in the education of our kiddos! If you have any questions please feel free to give me a call.



In case of Inclement Weather...

If a decision is made to close school or to have a late start, the announcement will be broadcast on KTTT, KKOT, KJSK, KZ100, KLIR, US92 radio stations and KOLN-TV, KMTV, and WOWT. After checking with the National Weather Service, the county roads crew, the Lakeview maintenance staff, and other sources, the Superintendent of Schools will

make the decision by approximately 7:00 a.m. Please refer to the news media listed above for up to date information.

If at all possible, refrain from calling the school. In addition to the broadcasts listed above, the Lakeview Community Schools will also be using SCHOOL-REACH. If you do not receive a SCHOOLREACH call, then we

do not have a working number on file.

Parents: You are the ones who must ultimately decide if conditions are safe for your child to travel to school during questionable weather. The school will respect your decision to keep your child home and will assist him/her in getting missed schoolwork made up.

Opening Procedures

Call to Order – Chairman Runge called the regular meeting to order at 8:00 p.m.

Pledge of Allegiance – Mueller led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Open Meeting Act – Chairman Runge noted the meeting would follow the open meeting act posted in the front of the media center.

Verification of Publication and Notification – The meeting notice was published in <u>The Columbus Telegram</u> and posted in all school buildings.

Roll Call – All members were present.

Excuse Board Member Absence – No members absent.

Approval of Agenda –It was moved by Pabian and seconded by Mueller to approve the agenda as modified. On roll call vote, Loseke, yes; Korte, yes; Mueller, yes; Pabian, yes; Schreiber, yes; and Runge, yes. Motion carried.

Staff/Student Presentations

Student Council Report – Lindsey Jaixen and Taylor Neuhalfen gave a verbal and written presentation on Student Council activities.

FBLA Report – Megan Humlicek and Wayde Rodehorst, also gave a verbal and written presentation on FBLA activities.

Curriculum Report – Cole Blomendahl provided the board with a handout outlining his course offerings. He also talked about the National and State FFA Conventions, poinsettia sales and the spring plant sales.

Time for Reading Practice: An Essential Ingredient for Student Success

A football coach wouldn't think of sending his team into a Friday night game without hours of practice during the previous week. Daily warm-up exercises and drills that provide plenty of reps are important to execution of plays and ultimately, the team's success.

This concept of practice can be applied to almost everything that humans learn to do. A concert violinist was once a four-year old with an eighth-sized instrument who practiced scales and bow strokes for untold hours.

A best-selling novelist more than likely practiced her craft for years by writing badly until she got the words just right. A heart surgeon did not cut a patient open his first day on the job. Many hours of practice were required to develop his precise skills and a steady hand.

Should we expect anything less for Lakeview students when it comes to development of their reading muscles? Ask any current reading expert—Kelly Gallagher, Stephen Krashen, or Nancie Atwell. After years of research and experience as teachers, all three agree on a simple formula for reading success: Give kids unlimited access to books and give them time to read books of their choice. According to these researchers' findings, this means a minimum of 30 minutes of uninterrupted free reading, consistently every day.

Last year, Mrs. Gustafson and I designed a reading program for English 10 and 12 based on this formula. Although we can't provide hard statistical data, we do have anecdotal evidence that students were reading more and enjoying it more than they had with AR. Our main goal in giving students time and choice was to change their negative attitudes towards reading. Both Mrs. Gustafson and I believe students took some big steps in that direction, largely because students actually had time to read and were reading books they had selected.

One interesting discovery we made was that reading *in class* led to more reading *outside of class*. Once students were given time to read at school, they somehow "found" time to read outside of school, too. It was a paradox of time multiplication, which we hadn't necessarily expected.

When we tried to analyze this paradox, we felt that the key was consistency of reading every day. Students read for at least 30 minutes, long enough to "get into" the story, thus making them want to continue reading, even if it was on their own time, outside of school. As one of last year's seniors remarked: "I really enjoyed the second quarter reading program. I would carry my book or kindle with me everywhere and read every extra moment."

When students realized that their reading ability and interest grew simply by spending time reading, they were stunned. One student explained, "I can now look at a thick book and know I can get through it, no big deal. I can start a big book and then see later how much I read—well, I feel like I really accomplished something."

So, if the formula **time** + **choice** = **more reading** works (and we think it does), where do we find time in the school day for reading practice all year long? There is no escaping the current trend in education, which demands we test students and then test them some more. All that testing and test prep takes a lot of, well, . . . time. Finding time for reading might require some compromise or juggling of the schedule. However, I would argue that schools can't afford NOT to make time for reading.

A classroom of quiet students, deeply engaged in reading, looks like a classroom where nothing is going on. However, this couldn't be further from the truth. "We must realize that recreational reading actually IS test preparation," argues Kelly Gallagher, author of *Readicide: How Schools Are Killing Reading and What You Can Do About It.*

Stephen Krashen's studies show literacy develops because of regular, consistent exposure to words through reading large numbers of books. "Reading is the only way we become good readers, develop a good writing style, an adequate vocabulary, advanced grammar, and the only way we become good spellers," he explains.

We want Lakeview graduates to be fluent readers, logical writers, and critical thinkers. If we buy into the idea that 30 minutes set aside for reading every day is not a waste of time, our students will have the opportunity to "practice" this essential life skill.

Reading is the key that unlocks the future for kids—the foundation for success in everything. Schools that are best preparing their students for the world of college, career, and life will make certain that students are getting their daily dose of "reading reps."

It's a regular exercise our students can't afford to miss.

- Visit your guidance counselor often for information about local scholarships.
- Place scholarship applications in deadline order. Local awards and college-specific applications deserve top priority because you're more likely to earn them.
- Update your activities, honors, community service or paid jobs using the <u>Activities Resume</u> at EducationQuest.org.
- Earn the best possible ACT/SAT scores by taking the exam in the spring of your junior year and again in the fall of your senior year.
- Use quality references such as a teacher, coach or counselor.
 Encourage them to write specific examples of your leadership skills. Give them advance notice and a specific deadline
- Tailor your essay to the scholarship. Ask an English teacher to read your essay and offer advice on making a big impact. Your essay will need to stand out from other applications.
- Pay close attention to grammar, spelling and neatness. Ask at least two people to proofread your entire application.

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Focus on Reading: English 9 — 2nd Quarter

This quarter, our focus will be on reading practice, with more time in class given for reading. There will be no formal instruction this quarter. Your work outside of class will be to continue reading.



At least 30 minutes per class period will be devoted to quiet, individual reading

practice. During this time, there will be no leaving the classroom. This means no bathroom break or going to your locker! Part of your grade will be coming to class prepared. You must always have a book to read when you come to class as you will not be allowed to go to the library. Some writing/journaling will be done at the beginning of each period. Four typed journal entries will be turned in throughout the quarter.

You will receive a weekly grade (50 points) for class participation, coming to class prepared, reading, and writing in your journal. If you are absent from class, for whatever reason, you have the opportunity to make up reading time during homeroom, study hall, before school, or after school.

Your typed journal entries will consist of your favorite entry every two weeks, to hand in. A sample has been done and attached for you.

Due Dates for Journals--30% of quarter grade

Wednesday, November 8th ~ Tuesday, November 20th Wednesday, December 5th ~ Tuesday, December 18th

Grading--70% of quarter grade

This quarter, you may read any book you choose; the books do not have to come from the AR list. You are not required to take an AR test (unless you want to for "fun") since points will not be used to determine grades.



Instead of points, you will read and keep track of the number of pages read. The scale is outlines below:

- A (100%) -- 2,000 pages (95%) --1,800 pages
- B (91%) -- 1,600 pages
 - (88%) -- 1,400 pages
- C (85%) -- 1,200 pages (82%) -- 1,000 pages
- D (76%) 600 pages
 - (72%) 400 pages
 - (65%) 200 pages



***Please note: If you come to class and fall asleep, or it appears you are sleeping, you will not receive the daily points. This also includes daydreaming or working on other things during reading time. The teacher will not continually ask you to put your head up, wake up, or get busy. It is up to you to stay on task and you shouldn't need reminding! The teacher must see you reading in order to give you your daily points.

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
