### CALENDAR CHANGE

### **BOARD MEETING**

At the January board meeting many items were discussed. I will try to communicate some of those items in

this section of this article.

Boundary Lines: The board discussed changing the elementary boundary lines prior to the next school year. This item will be discussed at the March 12 board meeting and board members are looking for input from the Lakeview patrons. It was discussed to change the elementary boundary line to 63rd Street. Those living west of that road would attend Platte Center Elementary and those east of east of that road would attend Shell Creek Elementary. Those living in the old Sunrise Elementary District would continue to be transported to either Platte Center or Shell Creek based on elementary class size. Current residents would be grandfathered into their current school district unless they request a change. If you have input or questions on moving the elementary boundary lines, please contact any of the school board members, the school administration or plan to attend the March 12 meeting to share your thoughts.

**Bussing:** The board voted to continue running a shuttle bus from Country View and County Mobile to the elementary schools for another year. This will help in the attempt to even out the elementary classroom numbers at the two elementary schools.

**Projects:** The board voted to move forward with finishing the tuck-pointing of the Lakeview building, refinishing

In 7th and 8th grade Lakeview students get the opportunity to take exploratory classes. These classes give students a chance to explore their interests and enhance their knowledge and skills in areas they may not normally experience. These exploratory experiences help our students assess their own skills and interests and begin to develop the map for their next stage of High School education.

Included in the 7<sup>th</sup> grade exploratory rotation is a class titled Careers. In the Careers class, 7<sup>th</sup> graders explore careers of interest, take interest inventories and take skills assessments. All of which help them form a better idea of "the places they can go", the future is theirs and at Lakeview r.-Sr. High School we hope to provide opportunities and experiences that help guide students to their future career.

A part of our career curriculum sequence at Lakeview Jr. High School each year our 8<sup>th</sup> graders attend the Career Opportunities Fair at Central Community College. The Career Opportunity Fair is scheduled for March 22nd.

The Career Fair consists of two main events:

- "Hands-On" Career Exploration Activities.
   There are several different businesses representing various career clusters at the event. These businesses will present activities that are handson and students get the opportunity to experience various careers in an interactive manner.

interactive group activities that include: 1. Interviewing Techniques; 2, Dress for Success Interview & Job Hunting Attire; 3. Money Smart Financial Education Life Skills; and 4. Job Application Process.

As students move from Junior High to High School, students are introduced to the "soft skills" necessary for a successful life and career. In 9th grade English Ms. Givens partners with the Platte County Extension agency and teaches a grant supported program where our students cover a curriculum from the popular book titled "Seven Habits of Highly Effective Teens." This curriculum is beneficial for helping students understand the "soft skills" needed to work with people. Although the "hard skills" may help people get a job, it will be the "soft skills" that will help them keep their job and gain promotions.

To complete the curriculum sequence in Career education at Lakeview, students in the 11th grade again have the opportunity to take a Career Exploration class. During this time in their High School experience they should have better idea of where they want to go in the future and the Careers class gives them one more chance to solidify these decisions or continue exploring options before making lofty college or career choices their senior year.

### Kindergarten Registration

Kindergarten registration for the 2012-2013 school year will be held at the Lakeview Community Schools District Office (the high school building), on Friday, March 16<sup>th</sup> from 8:00-11:30 a.m.

Please bring your child's state certified birth certificate (no copies), current immunization records, and <u>two</u> proofs of residency — (1) A current bill with parent(s) name and physical address <u>AND</u> (2) Either a lease agreement, property tax statement or mortgage statement. Your child does not need to attend.

A special day, Friday, April 13<sup>th</sup>, 2012, has been planned for your child to visit a kindergarten room. Your child will receive an invitation at a later date.

Keep in mind that new state law requires children be 5 years old by July 31.

If you are unable to attend on this date or if your child does not plan to attend kindergarten in the Lakeview district the Fall of 2012, please contact Traci Uldrich at 402-564-8518.



### In case of Inclement Weather...

If a decision is made to close school or to have a late start, the announcement will be broadcast on KTTT, KKOT, KJSK, KZ100, KLIR, US92 radio stations and KOLN-TV, KMTV, and WOWT. After checking with the National Weather Service, the county roads crew, the Lakeview maintenance staff, and other sources, the Superintendent of Schools will make the decision by approximately 7:00 a.m. Please refer to the news media listed above for up to date information.

If at all possible, refrain from calling the school. In addition to the broadcasts listed above, the Lakeview Community Schools will also be using SCHOOLREACH. When you answer the phone from Lakeview Community Schools, please be sure to say "Hello" and wait a few seconds and the automated message should begin. There is an option to listen to the English message and an option for the Spanish message. If you do not receive a SCHOOLREACH call, then we do not have a working number on file.

Parents: You are the ones who must ultimately decide if conditions are safe for your child to travel to school during questionable weather. The school will respect your decision to keep your child home and will assist him/her in getting missed schoolwork made up.

### <u>Lakeview Library News...</u>

We have been busy in the library with a bunch of new titles. We added to our collection some graphic novels and Manga titles. These are reading experiences that might be new to some of our students – and teachers, as well. Designed to resemble a comic book, this genre is fun to read but also a bit challenging. There is a lot going on visually and they create a dynamic reading experience. The Manga titles are a Japanese style of graphic novel. They are based in a core subject area such as math or science, but a story is built around a particular concept. We have added titles that cover the universe, electricity, and math concepts.

We have been having fun with Big

Nate, as well. These are books I purchased for our junior high students, but the senior high students are snapping them up, as well. Nate has just a terrible time getting through life without bungling everything he touches. While not high level reading, they are just funny to read. It is wonderful to hear laughter when the students compare their favorite parts of Nate's adventures. I have my own favorite Nate adventure dealing with a hockey stick and some gnomes. We also have initiated a "spoiler alert" signal when we are talking about a particular book - just so we don't ruin the story for someone else. These are the moments that I love as a librarian - watching stu-

dents share and read together.

Finally, we have started our digital citizenship unit in fifth and sixth grade. I would really encourage everyone to visit with their student about this topic. We are focusing on the concept of the "upstander." An upstander is the one person who can stop a cyberbully in their tracks by standing up for what is By contrast, a "bystander" watches and does nothing, or goes along with the group out of fear. It's easy to talk about this concept, but much harder to follow through in real life. I have posted some links to great resources for parents and students on the elementary library webpage.







### From the Gridance Office.....

### What happens after you submit the FAFSA?

If you're a college-bound senior, you and your parents may have already submitted the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) – or will soon do so. Here's what will happen next:

Expect your SAR — You will receive a Student Aid Report (SAR) after you submit the FAFSA. This acknowledges that your form was processed and can be used to make corrections to your FAFSA. You'll need the PIN you used to file the FAFSA to make corrections online.

<u>Did you use IRS Data Retrieval?</u> — If you did not use the new IRS Data Retrieval process when you filed your FAFSA, EducationQuest encourages you to "correct your FAFSA" and use the IRS Data Retrieval process to input income tax data for you and your parents. If you don't use the IRS Data Retrieval process, your college(s) may require you to provide a copy of your IRS tax transcript.

Expect a financial aid award notification — The colleges you listed on the FAFSA will send you a financial aid award notification (by mail or email) detailing the assistance they're offering. They may offer a combination of scholarships, grants, work-study and student loans.

<u>Compare award notifications</u> — Compare award notifications from the colleges. Calculate your out-of-pocket expenses for each school to get the whole financial picture. Use the <u>Award Letter Comparison Calculator</u> at EducationQuest.org to determine which school offers the best financial aid package. Respond to each notification keeping in mind that most students accept all award packages until they make their final college selection.

<u>Keep looking for scholarships!</u> — Many local, state and national scholarships have deadlines in March, April and May. Talk to your guidance counselor about scholarships that meet your criteria. For local and state scholarships, visit <u>ScholarshipQuest</u> at Education-Quest.org.

### Juniors: It's time to start your campus visits

Start looking at colleges your junior year so you can narrow your choices by the time you're a senior. If your school has a spring break, that's a perfect time to schedule a campus visit. Follow these tips:

Explore your career interests. Before you determine which colleges you want to visit, think about your career interests and then research colleges that fit your interests. Ask your guidance counselor about career assessment tools at your school. To find colleges that offer your desired major, see the <u>Index of Majors</u> at Education-Quest.org.

Check out college websites. You'll find admission requirements, academic and social information, and campus photos or a virtual tour.

Visit your top college choices while the schools are in session. You won't get the true flavor of the school during breaks or finals week.

Schedule your visits at least two weeks in advance. Ask for ap-

pointments with an admissions representative, financial aid counselor, and a faculty member in your area of interest.

Talk to a faculty member about upper-level classes in your anticipated major. This will help you understand the coursework that will be required and the degree of difficulty.

Ask the financial aid counselor how the college may offset tuition costs and about college-based scholarship applications and deadlines.



It was really great to see the community of Columbus in our gym. The families and church members attended the event.






### STUDENTS BRING UP THEIR GRADES
