Preparing for the 21st Century

This article is intended to keep you up to date with some of the technology plans we are making for Lakeview Community Schools. Last year at a Board Advisory council we presented the proposal of creating a technology study committee to investigate the many options of improving the technology here at Lakeview K-12.

Earlier this school year we assembled the technology study committee, the committee is made up of School Board members, Parents, Elementary, Junior High, and High School Teachers and Administrators. The committee's task is to investigate and study the op-

tions of implementing more technology into our everyday instruction, so that we can improve the way we deliver our curriculum and prepare our students for the $21^{\rm st}$ century. Thus far the committee has interviewed 2 schools and has attended a 1 to 1 conference.

The first school we interviewed is a 1 to 1 laptop school, which means they have one laptop for every one of their students in grades 7-12. Every year more and more schools in Nebraska are moving in this direction, it is the study committee's task to find out why these schools are moving in this direction and if it has made a significant differ-

ence in the education of their students. The committee is currently investigating the pro's and con's of implementing a 1 to 1 initiative here at Lakeview. The second school the committee interviewed is just beginning the adoption process of being a 1 to 1 Ipad school in grades 9-12. Both of these interviews were extremely informative and the committee was able to ask questions and determine what might be best for Lakeview Community Schools.

Along with interviewing schools some of the committee had the opportunity to attend a 1 to 1 conference, at the conference there were many schools attending who are already 1 to 1 schools and several schools who are considering or investigating the idea of becoming a 1 to 1 school. The schools that are already 1 to 1 were able to share their knowledge and experiences learned through their process. The conference and the discussions held in the open forum were very enlightening and helped our committee brainstorm possibilities for our students and staff here at Lakeview Community Schools.

Throughout our planning process we will continue to keep you up to date. The committee's next steps in the process are to survey staff, students and parents so that we can gather input from all stakeholders. This information will help guide us in making the best decision possible for our students and their future. If you have any questions or would like to add your input please feel free to give me a call.

For those of you who sent your child off to 7th grade this year, I hope that your child's transition from 6th grade to 7th grade has been smooth. I know that our Junior High teachers work very hard to help transition the new 7th graders into the Junior High routine. We are ending the first quarter of the school year and by the looks of it, most of the Junior kids appear to be enjoying their experience.

It is a change for many of them, going from 1 teacher all day and not having a bell schedule at the Elementary to having several teachers during the day and moving from class to class using a bell schedule. For some of our Junior High students this can be a difficult transition. Especially if they are the type of student who has a difficult time getting organized. We take extra efforts

in our Computer/Study skills class to provide students with study skills and organizational strategies that we hope gives them a chance to be more successful. Although we take these extra steps sometimes the physical and emotional changes in the Junior High students and the social opportunities they have in the Junior High can present distractions for these students. The Junior High students are ready to read! On Sept 21st, we kicked of our annual Junior High Reading Challenge. This year the 7th and 8th graders are in a reading competition. The class that reads the most pages will get the opportunity to dunk one of the Junior High

teachers or administrator in a dunking booth at the end of the school year at the Junior High Reading Challenge celebration. When students pass their AR test they get the opportunity to vote for 1 teacher or administrator that they want to try to dunk. The teacher or administrator who gets the most votes will get the opportunity to go swimming in the dunk tank. The Junior High Reading Challenge has been a fun and exciting experience for many of the Junior High students and has added an incentive for the students to read outside of school. Research shows that students who read at least 21.4 minutes per day generally improve in all academic areas! Please help us encourage our students to read, it is a skill they will need for the rest of their life!







Seniors...it's time to start the admissions process!

College may still seem far off, but admission deadlines will start hitting this fall. Follow these steps to stay on track:

- Contact your top colleges NOW and ask about deadlines and the process for applying for admission, college-based scholarships and financial aid.
- Apply to your top 3-4 colleges before the deadline. Along with your application, the colleges will require your high school transcript, class rank, GPA and ACT/SAT score. They may also request a list of your extracurricular activities, letters of recommendation, an essay, and an interview.
- Update your Activities Resume. Because extracurricular activities are an important part of the admissions application, keep them up-to-date by using the <u>Activities Resume</u> at My.EducationQuest.org.
- Contact your admissions representative periodically to stay informed about deadlines and campus activities.
- Attend a Financial Aid Program to learn college funding options Juniors and seniors to learn about financial aid and other college funding options, attend an EducationQuest Financial Aid Program with your parents or an adult who can help you with college planning. Find dates and locations in the <u>Upcoming Events section</u> at EducationQuest.org.

Juniors...start researching colleges

If you can narrow your choices by the end of your junior year, your senior year will be less stressful. Here's how to get started: • Review <u>College Profiles</u> at EducationQuest.org for information about colleges in Nebraska and across the country. If you're interested in going to an out-of-

state school, check out the Midwest Student Exchange Program at http://msep.mhec.org.

- Meet with college representatives who visit your school, and then visit the websites of the colleges that interest you to learn more about the schools.
- Once you've narrowed your choices, schedule campus visits. Try to visit in the spring of your junior year while colleges are still in session.




Stand Together




Monday ~ Pajama Day ~ Wear pajamas or sleep wear appropriate for school
