Student NeSA Reports, Coming Soon!

By the time you read this article you may have already received your child's individual NeSA student report. This article is written to inform you of the report and also to include some information that I hope is beneficial as you read and interpret your child's scores.

NeSA stands for Nebraska Schools Accountability, as a part of the new accountability system every student's parents/guardian in grades 3-8 and 11 will receive an individual report on how their child or children did on the last NeSA-Reading and NeSA-Math test. Students were as-

sessed on the NeSA-Reading and NeSA-Math last spring. Students in grades 4, 8, and 11 were also assessed in NeSA-Writing.

It is important to remember that these tests are summative in nature, meaning they are taken one time at the end of the year. It is a snapshot of a student's performance, at that time. Over a longer period of time the data provides a clearer picture of how your child is performing. This year the report includes Reading and Math scores for students in 3-8 and 11th grades and a Science score for students in the 5th, 8th and 11th grade



Included in this newsletter is a sample report, on the sample report I have included numbers indicating the different parts of the report. Below is an explanation of those different parts. Match the number of the ex-

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must again ask for your patience. We also need your help with the traffic flow when dropping off and picking up students or parking at the school. At the time I am writing this article, we are currently working on the budget for the 2012-2013 school year. Last year our total budget was set at 96 cents/\$100 dollars of valuation, which included the \$5.4 million dollar bond issue. It is the goal of the board to provide a quality education for each student while watching the taxpayer dollar. This past year has been a difficult one due to the drought-like conditions. Keeping that in mind, next year's budget will be kept to a minimum tax asking.

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planation with the number on the report to interpret your child's student report.

1. Identification Information

Student's identification information is provided at the top of the report. The students name, birth date, school district and grade are listed.

2. Scale Score and Performance Level

The student's scale score and performance level for Reading and Math is reported in this table. The range of the scale score is 0-200. An asterisk (*) next to the scale score indicates that the student received one of the not tested codes.

3. Content Standard

The first column in this table lists the content standard tested.

4. Total Number of Questions

The second column in this table lists the total number of questions and points possible for each content standard.

5. Student Percent Correct

The third column in this table shows the percent correct for each content standard. If a student was assigned a not tested code or if no attempt was made, this column is blank.

6. District Percent Correct

The fourth column in this table shows the percent correct at the district level for each content standard. This allows the reader to compare how an individual student performed as measured against district performance for the same standard.

7. State Percent Correct

The last column in this table shows the percent correct

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at the state level for each content standard. This allows the reader to compare how an individual student performed as measured against state performance for the same standard.

8. Interpretation of Chart


This paragraph provides an estimate of the range in scale scores the student would likely receive if he or she were to take the same test again. This statement is included only if the test had not been voided.

9. Performance Levels

The NeSA-Reading results are reported according to three performance levels: Exceeds Standards, Meets Standards, and Below Standards. Scale scores range from 0-200 for each grade. Each performance level has a correlating scale score range.

10. Status

The area at the bottom of the report lists that purpose of the NeSA tests and information regarding the Nebraska Department of Education website.

This report provides a record of student's test results on the NeSA in reading.

Scale Score
A student's scale score is a transformed version of the raw score. It provides comparable meaning across grades and across years, but only within the same subject area. Scores should not be compared across content standards or years because the items vary in difficulty level. No score means the student did not test.

Performance Levels
The NeSA is designed to measure knowledge against state standards. Scores on these tests are grouped into three performance levels. The performance level chart (found below) shows the scale score ranges associated with each level.

Performance on Standards
Reading is composed of different content standards. The chart on the right shows how the student did on these content standards.

Interpretation of Chart
The chart displays where the performance cut score lies within the possible scale score range. Scale scores are represented by the diamond (♦).
For example, student's scale score in reading is 111. Note that the diamond representing this score falls in the Meets Standards scale score range. If students with this scale score were retested, they would usually be expected to fall between 097 and 125.

K-8 Pupil Transportation Reimbursement Forms found on Lakeview website

Reimbursement request forms were given to your child at the beginning of the 2012-2013 school year. Please complete the form quarterly and return to your school building office.

Mileage is paid for each actual mile traveled to school by the most direct route (minus 3 miles), to the parent/guardian transporting students to school

or a bus pick up site, whichever is closer. Use the calendar on the reverse side of the form to track days you actually drove students to school.

School Meals are Changing – New School Meal Requirements

You may have heard there are new requirements for school meals. The new requirements are great news for our students! The new requirements will help Lakeview Community Schools build on the work we are already doing to provide more fruits, vegetables, whole grains and healthier entrees in our schools' cafeteria.

Some of the New Requirements include:

- Increasing the amount of fruits and vegetables
- Reducing the sodium in meals over the next 10 years
- Setting calorie limits
- Increasing whole grains
- Limiting the amount of meat/meat alternative and grains

Students will now be required to have $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of fruits and/or vegetables on their tray for it to count as a full meal. Anything less than a full meal will be charged as individual items. We plan to offer a variety of fruits and vegetables daily to give students more options hop-

ing their choosing fruits and vegetables will be easy.

Schools are now limited on how much meat/meat alternate and grains can be offered. This means, some of the main dishes may not be as large as they have been in the past. Remember, there will be more fruits and vegetables available to fill out the meal and ensure students have plenty to eat!

In Lakeview Community Schools, we have already made progress toward meeting the new meal pattern requirements.

What We Are Doing

- Fresh fruits and vegetables are served every day.
- Sandwiches are served on whole wheat buns.
- All pasta served is whole grain.
- Milk is available as low-fat or fat-free.
- Main dishes have been changed to reduce sodium.
- Dark green and orange vegetables are served on a weekly basis.

- Dried beans have been incorporated into some of the recipes.
- Salad bars are available every day that include romaine lettuce and spinach.

We will face some challenges to meet the new requirements on a tight budget, but our school nutrition program will work hard to make these healthy changes for our students and make each meal something our students will enjoy!

How You Can Help

The school nutrition program needs the support of the parents to succeed! Parents can support his effort by encouraging your child to give the healthier meals a try, joining your child for lunch, talk about the healthy options, or simply introduce your child to these healthy changes at home. You are your child(ren)'s primary role model. When they see you chose healthy foods, they are more likely to choose them as well.

- Medication forms must be filled out completely before medications will be given by school personnel. Please indicate if your student is able to take cough drops, Acetaminophen or Ibuprofen. (All medication must be turned in to the office to be stored.)
