Before you start reading the rest of this article, I want you to take a look at the picture above. What's in the picture? Or maybe a better question - what is the object in the picture? I began to feel a little surprised, this little girl who had never ran over 20 yards before had now made it over a 1/2 mile, without stopping. Opening Procedures

Call to Order – Chairman Runge called the regular meeting to order at 8:00 p.m.

Pledge of Allegiance – Korte led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Open Meeting Act – Chairman Runge noted the meeting would follow the open meeting act posted in the front of the media center.

Verification of Publication and Notification – The meeting notice was published in The Columbus Telegram and posted in all school buildings.

Roll Call – All members were present.

Excuse Board Member Absence – No members absent.

Approval of Agenda – It was moved by Loseke and seconded by Pabian to approve the agenda as modified. On roll call vote, Loseke, yes; Korte, yes; Mueller, yes; Pabian, yes; Schreiber, yes; and Runge, yes. Motion carried.

Staff/Student Presentations

FBLA Report – Carol Crabtree, FBLA President, gave a verbal and written presentation on FBLA activities.

Student Council Report – Taylor Neuhalfen gave a verbal and written presentation on Student Council activities.

Recognition of Visitors/Communications from the Public – Visitors included Taylor Neuhalfen, Student Council; Carol Crabtree, FBLA; Jerry Jaixen, patron; Tylor Ellyson, Columbus Telegram; Matthew Miigerl, Integrated Controls; Gene Benes, Benes Heating & Air Conditioning; Kurt Frenzen, staff. There were no comments from the public.

Administrative Reports

Superintendent – Reported items included 1) Kiwanis/Optimist Clubs had 26 people eat lunch at Lakeview and tour the Shell Creek Elementary on Nov. 9; 2) Insurance changes for 2013-2014 by EHA; 3) After school program grant from ADM is available to apply for use this year; 4) Kiwanis is supplying free dictionaries for 3rd grade students in the Lakeview, Christ Lutheran and St. John's school systems; 5) Leadership Columbus will have 3-6 people eat lunch and tour Lakeview next Friday; and 6) The MOU is available for board members for the pilot evaluation program.

Principals – Mr. Mlinar – 1) United Way Kids for Change Pro-

gram encouraged students to donate change; 2) Parent-Teacher Conference attendance was nearly 100%; 3) Veteran's Day program was held on November 9; 4) PTO sponsored the Fall Book Fair November 5-9; 5) ITBS testing is going on this week; and 6) Kids on the Block sponsored by the Nebraska Elks Foundation will perform on December 5. Mr. Schrunck – 1) PTO family movie night on November 16; 2) Listed the daily winners of Red Ribbon Week; 3) Ms. Kjergaard will be teaching a geography enrichment program for selected 5/6 grade students next week. The program will conclude with a geography bee on January 15; 4) 3rd-6th grade students now have lockers; 5) ITBS testing November 5-16; 6) Veteran's Day Program was held on November 9; 7) Kids on the Block on December 5; and 8) Birthday assembly on November 30. Mr. Borer – 1) Parent-Teacher attendance was up this year – High School – 50% and Junior High – 67%; 2) Review the school improvement program; 3) Shared the November 12 in-service agenda; and 4) Reviewed the November 5 technology meeting. Mr. Shadley – A handout was provided to the board which contained the fall sport wrap up and specifically

mentioned the following: All-State Music Selections: Vocal – Carol Crabtree, Chase Gronenthal and Amanda Humlicek; Band – Cayla Cuba.

Action Items

Consent Agenda – It was moved by Schreiber and seconded by Mueller to approve the agenda as presented. On roll call vote, Korte, yes; Mueller, yes; Pabian, yes; Loseke, yes; Schreiber, yes; and Runge, yes. Motion carried.

Approval of Resignations – There were no resignations for consideration.

Approval of Contracts – It was moved by Korte and seconded by Loseke to approve Holly Anderson, Amanda Urkoski, Forest Dehaven and Kasey Hansen as substitute teachers. On roll call vote, Mueller, yes; Pabian, yes; Loseke, yes; Schreiber, yes; Korte, yes; and Runge, yes. Motion carried.

East Gym Ventilation Project – Gene Benes from Benes Heating & AC was present to discuss options on ventilating the east gym. The options included straight ventilation to installing air conditioning. No action was taken.

Lakeview HVAC Controls – Matt Miigerl from Integrated Controls informed the board that they could (See Minutes — Continued on page 4)

make their current HVAC system much more efficient by installing system controls. No action was taken.

Varsity Football Field — Kurt Frenzen was present to discuss the football field and gave the board four options to consider for improving the game field. They ranged from two options with natural grass to two options of different makes of field turf. No action was taken.

Lakeview Lighting Project — The board was informed that bids to improve lighting in most classrooms were requested and received. There were still some questions to be answered before the bids would be made public. It was moved by Loseke and seconded by Korte to allow the Building and Grounds Committee to research and move forwards with the lighting project at their discretion. On roll call vote, Pabian, yes; Schreiber, yes; Loseke, yes; Korte, yes; Mueller, yes; and Runge, yes. Motion carried.

Shell Creek Addition/Renovation Project — The board held a brief discussion on installing lights on the south side of the building and lights on the west and east parking. A portion of the tile will be replaced this summer.

District Busing — The board visited briefly about the busing of students. Mr. Freeman and the principals provided the board with the number of families that currently ride. The board would like to get a report that indicates the total spent on busing last year and the

total mileage paid to parents that drive K-8 students. They would also like the same numbers for this year up to December.

Audit Report — It was moved by Pabian and seconded by Mueller that the 2011-2012 Audit Report be approved for Lakeview Community Schools. On roll call vote, Schreiber, yes; Loseke, yes; Korte, yes; Mueller, yes; Pabian, yes; and Runge, yes. Motion carried.

Multicultural Report — The building principals reviewed some of last year's building activities and Mr. Freeman reviewed some of the lessons that fall under Multicultural Education. It was moved by Schreiber and seconded by Pabian to approve the Multicultural Report for the 2012-2013 School Year. On roll call vote, Loseke, yes; Korte, yes; Mueller, yes; Pabian, yes; Schreiber, yes; and Runge, yes. Motion carried.

Discussion Items

Board Committee Reports — Committee activity was discussed. The Curriculum Committee set a meeting date of November 17 at 6:15 p.m., prior to the district technology committee meeting.

State Education Conference — The board discussed travel arrangements for attending the State Education Conference in LaVista.

Staff Recognition Banquet — Tentative ideas on the staff recognition event were shared with the board. Plans are currently to honor last year's staff the last day of school with a noon meal. Tentative plans also are to honor this year's staff at a breakfast at the start of the next school year. The board

will think about the ideas and discuss this topic again next month.

Executive Session

It was moved by Schreiber and seconded by Pabian to go into executive session for the purpose of discussing the superintendent's evaluation and to discuss personnel issues where pending litigation is possible for the protection of the public interest and for the prevention of needless injury to the reputation of any individuals involved. On roll call vote, Korte, yes; Mueller, yes; Pabian, yes; Schreiber, yes; Loseke, yes; and Runge, yes. Motion carried.

A five minute recess was taken at 11:09 p.m. before entering into executive session at 11:14 p.m. The board came out of executive session at 11:55 p.m.

Adjournment — Chairman Runge declared the meeting adjourned at 11:58 p.m.

on reviewing the district test scores and the improvement strategies that the administration and teachers are using to help improve student achievement.

Mr. Schrunck & Mr. Mlinar reviewed the State of the Schools Report. This included showing a couple of ways a person could access this report, a review of the scores and a discussion concerning the scores.

Mr. Borer reviewed the PLAN test. This is a pre-ACT test that our sophomores take each year.

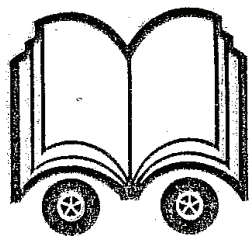
Mr. Mlinar reviewed the Federal AYP decisions. He explained the terminology used and where our individual schools are at concerning meeting the standards.

Paying for College

Follow these steps to determine how you'll pay for college.

Step 1: Learn about types of financial aid

Scholarships come from private donors or from your college, and are not repaid. Some are based on financial need, while others are based on criteria such as academics, leadership, athletics, talents, or military involvement.

Grants* are based on financial need and you don't repay them. They include:

- Pell Grant
- Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG)
- State grants
- College-based grants

Work-Study*, also based on financial need, allows you to earn money while attending college. You get paid for hours worked, so don't expect money up-front to pay tuition. Work-Study earnings will not affect future financial aid eligibility.

Loans* are a type of financial aid you must repay with interest. Some are in your name and some are for parent(s).

Several types of loans are available for both students and parents. [View our loan chart](#) for details.

**These types of financial aid are based on FAFSA results.*

Step 2: Apply for scholarships

Look for scholarships during your junior and senior years.

- Ask your counselor about local and national scholarships.
- Review [ScholarshipQuest](#) for local and state scholarships.
- Apply for college-based awards.
- Look for national awards using free Internet-based scholarship searches.

Step 3: Request a Personal Identification Number (PIN)

The PIN is your signature for the electronic FAFSA.

Request a PIN for you and one for a parent at pin.ed.gov. Keep your PIN for future years.

4: Complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Stu-

dent Aid)

The FAFSA is your application for federal, state and college-based financial aid. Complete the form at fafsa.gov. The colleges you list on the application will receive the results and will use that information to award financial aid.

- Apply after January 1 but before the colleges' priority date to get the best financial aid package.
- Be aware of a new [IRS Data Retrieval Process](#) that will simplify the income tax portion of your FAFSA.
- Complete the FAFSA every year you're in college.

Colleges use this standard formula to calculate your financial need:

Cost of Education (determined by the college)
 - Expected Family Contribution (based on FAFSA results)
 = Financial Need

Your "financial need" determines the type and amount of financial aid you will receive.

Step 5: Complete the financial aid process.

Expect a Student Aid Report (SAR). The SAR acknowledges that your FAFSA was received and can be used to make corrections to the form. You'll need your PIN to make electronic corrections.

You might also receive request from the college for documents to verify your FAFSA information. If so, send the documents to the college financial aid office.

Expect a financial aid award notification from the colleges that accepted you for admission. It will detail the assistance they're offering based on your financial need. Respond to all award notifications by the deadlines.

Compare financial aid awards to determine what you would need to spend out-of-pocket or borrow in student loans at each school to cover the full cost of your education. Use our [Award Letter Calculator](#) for an easy comparison.

Once you select a college, notify the other schools of your decision.

If you need **student loans**, apply for them through your college. They will provide the necessary forms. Allow several weeks for processing time.

Using Technology for Reading Interest

Our students have always lived with advancing technology; they don't know the world without it. Ask them who Rhett Butler, Miss Havisham, or Moby Dick are and they will probably look at you with a puzzled expression. Now, ask them to message, blog, tweet or facebook you their plans for the weekend, and they'll have it done before you finish the directions. So with the help of our school technology goal, we sought out two classroom sets of kindles.

In an effort to increase our reading interest, Mrs. Zach (English 12) and I began researching better reading practices, and along the way, we realized another aspect we could add was technology. How can we appeal to students in today's society if we don't utilize technology?

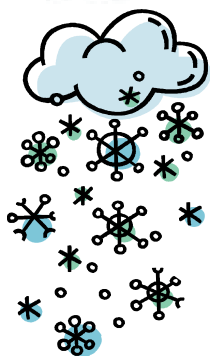
Dollars were budgeted to provide both of our classrooms with a set of 24 kindles including a book allowance. Because we have multiple sets of kindles, we have the advantage of having multiple copies of books. The kindles allow our students to download a book the day a new release is put on the shelves. It also allows our students to get a copy of a book that might always be checked out from our library. Once the book has been purchased, it gives the reader immediate access with the kindles.

The students have to sign a user agreement before they can take the kindle out of the room. Students are allowed two weeks to check them out. Some students really like the use of the kindle. One of the students said, "With the kindle, I never know how big the book exactly is. I lose the intimidation fac-

tor that gets to so many young readers." Another student said, "The kindle is a bit different than reading a book. All it takes to flip a page is a push of a button. It seems like you are reading less and you flip pages faster." The demand for kindles is high. I have a waiting list for kindles in my classroom; however, it comes down to an individual preference because one senior even said, "A plain old book will do just fine for me."

The students have learned to take suggestions from friends, teachers, or the librarians and have continued reading. They've connected with classmates who enjoy the same type of books. They've collaborated in class. The communication among my students regarding books has exploded. Each student has set up a GoodReads account where they create bookshelves of books they have read or want to read, as well as receive recommendations on books they might enjoy based on their choices. Mrs. Stogdill, librarian, told them GoodReads is like "Facebook for bookworms." We also created a Twitter hashtag to follow. Students are using Twitter to ask for suggestions or tweet a good recommendation (#readingpractice).

I'm not sure if it's the reading, the technology, or a combination, but what I do know is that the students are proud of themselves and proud of each other. Some students have finished more books in this single quarter than they have read in their lifetimes. They're having fun exploring new books. They're reading and talking about them. Most importantly, they're learning what interests them and spending time actually reading.
