

#### From The Superintendent's Desk — By Dr. Plas

As you may know, there is a lot of financial trouble in the state of Nebraska as they begin this legislative session. The current projections are showing that there will be close to a one billion dollar shortfall in the biennium if nothing changes to the state budget. If history holds true, there will be massive cuts to education based on these projections since education accounts for about 25% of the state budget. While many do not think we receive state aid, we do for special education reimbursements and option enrollment. Like many (170 of the 245 schools in NE) we do NOT receive any type of equalization aid since our resources (property valuation) outweigh our needs according to the TEEOSA formula. Due to this funding mechanism, Nebraska ranks 49th in the country in state aid given to schools. Because of the lack of state money being put into education it is not surprising that Nebraska also ranks 7th in the country for reliance on local property taxes. Here at Lakeview, since we are not able to receive any type of 'equalization aid' from our state, our property owners are forced to shoulder a large majority of the financial needs for our school district.

In many recent interviews, Governor Pete Ricketts has said high property taxes are a direct result of local schools overspending. This is flat out NOT TRUE! Nebraska schools have averaged a 4% increase per year to their general fund over the last 10 years. Lakeview has averaged just a 1.5% spending increase per year over the last 5 years despite our student population increasing by 30%. With increasing insurance rates, wages, electric costs, fuel costs, and transportation costs I would consider these statewide and Lakeview increases pretty darn good!

In response to this negative publicity, Lakeview has been trying to be active in not only spreading a positive message about public schools but also working to advocate for a new funding mechanism for public education in our state. We have been working with several organizations to come up with a common message to take to the legislature. We have two guiding principles that all can agree upon:

- 1. Adequate and sustainable funding of high quality K-12 education is imperative for the future of Nebraska
- 2. Tax reform which reduces the over-reliance on local property taxes is necessary to balance the tax burden with all Nebraska taxpayers

You will be seeing some articles in local and state newspapers in the next week or two about this very topic. Please know Lakeview is not sitting back and doing nothing about this misinformation and fund mechanism problem. We want to be on the front lines trying to do what is best for our students, our school, and our patrons.

## Notes from the Jr/Sr High Principal

#### **Transition From NeSA Testing to ACT Test**

Starting this Spring all Nebraska Juniors are required to take the ACT college admissions test instead of the Nebraska state NeSA tests which they have previously taken the past few years. All 3<sup>rd</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> graders will continue to take the state NeSA tests.

The state of Nebraska will pay \$47 per exam for an approximate cost of \$1.03 million to test 22,000 juniors in Nebraska. Nebraska law requires the state to cover the costs, so all Juniors will get the opportunity to take the ACT one time without having to pay for it themselves.

The ACT is a national college admissions exam that consists of four subject-area tests: English, math, reading and science.

The testing date for the Nebraska ACT this year is on April 19 $^{\circ}$ . Taking the ACT test takes about 3½ hours, which includes the writing test which Nebraska has adopted.

Prior to the testing day Lakeview plans to prepare our Juniors by using the John Baylor ACT test prep program. During the month of March all Juniors will go through 14 test prep sessions which includes an interactive video and practice homework. Mr. Johnson and selected teachers will work through the test prep with the students.

In addition to testing our Juniors on April 19th we are planning to make April 19th a testing day for all our students, we have created a DRAFT schedule of the testing day which includes the following:

7th -8th graders- will take NeSA Math and Reading tests 9th graders- will participate in College Visitation 10th graders- will take Pre-ACT 11th graders- will take the ACT

More information on the testing day will come in the next few weeks as we continue to iron out the details.

#### **Lakeview Safety Sweeps - Providence Working Canines**

**Dear Parents** 

Realizing student safety remains a high priority of the Lakeview Community Schools, our District has elected to implement a highly successful program to assist in minimizing the presence of prohibited items on our school grounds. It is our desire to create a safer learning environment.

Our staff, teachers and administration work diligently each day to try to make a student safe environment. However, we are limited in the scope of our abilities. Therefore we have formed an Agreement with a private company to provide random Safety Sweeps to our District utilizing highly trained non-aggressive Working Canines. Many school districts in Nebraska have experienced noticeable results in calling upon the skills of these exceptional canines and have realized students are now making better choices while on school grounds.

Random Safety Sweeps will include parking lots, lockers, sports facilities, commons, perimeters, and other areas as needed. Please note that students are to make certain their vehicles are free from prohibited items while parked on school property. These dogs are highly skilled and trained to pick up the smell of gun powder, if there is a firearm in your student's vehicle on student grounds the dogs can pick up this scent. School and gymnasium locker contents are the responsibility of the assigned student. We request that you speak with your student concerning our District's safety policies.

We understand that being a Parent in today's society can be challenging. We want to partner with you towards a common objective of keeping our students safe. We hope you will work with us and appreciate the steps the District is taking on behalf your children.








Most scholarships are based on academics, but others are based on community service, school involvement, or talent in art, dance, music, or athletics. Some are based on financial need as determined by the <u>FAFSA</u> (Free Application for Federal Student Aid).

It's time to start applying for scholarships. Here's where you can find them:

- <u>ScholarshipQuest</u> at EducationQuest.org features over 2,000 Nebraska-based scholarships. After you create a profile, you'll be matched with scholarships that fit your criteria.
- Your school counselor's office. Visit regularly to check on local and

national awards.

- The college you plan to attend. Contact the school for a list of scholarships they provide and application procedures.
- National search sites such as <u>College Board</u>, <u>Peterson's</u> and <u>Chegg</u>.
- Other resources could include your coach, clubs and organizations, and your parents' employers and civic organizations.

Apply **by March 31** for EducationQuest's *Scavenger Hunt Scholarship*. You might win \$500 toward your college education. Here's how it works:



#### Dear Parents and Students,

With the arrival of the second semester seniors will soon need to finalize their post high school plans. If you need an updated transcript please be sure to e-mail me your request noting the school you want it sent to. Please check the scholarship blog on the school's website often to be up to date on new scholarships. Local scholarships will soon be available as well. If the scholarship requires a letter of reference please give ample time for the reference to be written. Do not wait until the last minute to request a reference. If you have received a scholarship award letter please let me know so I can include it in your file for awards night. Also be sure to check the ScholarshipQuest website for any scholarships you may have missed.

All juniors will be taking the ACT on April 19<sup>th</sup>, at no cost to the student, in accordance to new state legislation. To prepare for this Lakeview is offering a semester long ACT prep class and we will also be offering a month long preparatory course preceding the April 19<sup>th</sup> test for all juniors. The month long course will take place in the student's regular math, science and English classes. The scores from the April 19<sup>th</sup> test will count as college entrance exam scores. Students may also register to take the ACT on other dates at <a href="https://www.act.org">www.act.org</a> but this will be at the student's expense.

Juniors who have not taken a college visit should plan to take at least one visit in the spring. Parents please be sure to accompany your student on their visit. You can schedule a college visit by visiting the admissions page of the college of your choice and contacting the admission department. If you are unsure of how to do this I can help you set up a visit. Also be sure to pick up a college visit form from the guidance office before you take the visit. There are also a number of college fairs in March and April that may help in narrowing down where you might want to make a college visit. A list of those college fairs is in included in Education Quest portion of this newsletter.


Platte Center Science students in Grades 4-6 are once again attempting to raise rainbow trout in the classroom. Last year the students were able to see the development of the trout to the "fry"

stage, and this year they are hoping to raise the trout to the "fingerling" stage. This is a project developed by the Nebraska Game and

Parks. Rainbow trout eggs were delivered on January, 11 and are currently in the "eyed" stage which means that the embryo is developing normally and is now able to withstand considerable movement. With 10-15 days the wiggling embryos will release enzymes to dissolve the eggshell, and eventually will break through the shell. The next stage will be the alevin or sac fry stage and will be between three quarters to I inch in length. The alevin discard their shell membranes,



but the yolk-sacs remain attached to their stomachs. Students will be responsible for testing the ph, nitrite, and ammonia levels of the water three times a week. Data recording and observations will be recorded weekly. Wish these future fish biologists luck!
