Oh, The Places They Can Go!

Here at Lakeview Jr.-Sr. High School we are making a determined effort to provide our students with career and college experiences at an early age. I am convinced if students have these opportunities at an early age they are going to have a better idea of what they want to be and where they want to go in their life.

When students begin to think about these career opportunities they begin to formulate a mental map of where they want to go and how they will get there. This type of thinking leads to a relevant education for our students and it gives them a purpose or a goal, and purpose gives way to motivation. This type of guidance and exploration is a vital component to a well balanced education.

In 7th and 8th grade, Lakeview students get the opportunity to take exploratory classes. These classes give students a chance to explore their interests and enhance their knowledge and skills in areas they may not normally experience. These exploratory experiences help our students assess their own skills and interests and begin to develop the map for their next stage of High School education.

Included in the 7th grade exploratory rotation is a class titled Careers. In the Careers class, 7th graders explore careers of interest, take interest inventories and take skills assessments. All of which help them form a better idea of "the places they can go." The future is theirs and at Lakeview Jr.-Sr. High School we hope to provide opportunities and experiences which help guide students to their future career.

As a part of our career curriculum sequence at Lakeview Jr. High School each year our 8th graders attend the Career Opportunities Fair at Central Community College. The Career Opportunity Fair is scheduled for a date in mid March.

The Career Fair consists of two main events:

"Hands-On" Career Exploration Activities. There are several different businesses representing various career clusters at the event. These businesses will present activities which are hands-on and students get the opportunity to experience various careers in an interactive manner.

Career & Life Skills Activities. There are also interactive group activities that include: I. Interviewing Techniques; 2, Dress for Success Interview & Job Hunting Attire; 3. Money Smart Financial Education Life Skills; and 4. Job Application Process.

As students move from Junior High to High School, students are introduced to the "soft skills" necessary for a successful life and career. In 9th grade English, Mrs. Legenza partners with the Platte County Extension agency and teaches a grant supported program where students cover a curriculum from the popular book titled "Seven Habits of Highly Effective Teens." This curriculum is beneficial for helping students understand the "soft skills" needed to work with people. Although the "hard skills" may help people get a job, it is the "soft skills" that will help them keep their job and gain promotions.

All 9th graders at Lakeview also get to experience a program called "Reality 101" where our 9th grade students participate in a "real life" game simulation. The program is made possible through a partnership with our local Columbus Chamber of Commerce "Drive 4 Five" program. Students choose a career, are given an average salary in that career and must budget their income taking in consideration such things as mortgage, insurance, car payments, day care and the many cost of living expenses we all must consider. The simulation is truly "Reality 101" for many of our 9th grade students. This years "Reality 101" event will take place in April

To complete the curriculum sequence in Career Education at Lakeview, students in the 11th grade again have the opportunity to take a Career Exploration class. During this time in their High School experience they should have a better idea of where they want to go in the future and the Careers class gives them one more chance to solidify these decisions or continue exploring options before making lofty college or career choices their senior year.

We are confident that these educational experiences are a tremendous benefit for our students, and we are excited that they have the chance to participate in these events. If you have any questions, please feel free to give me a call.

ACT test- Planning and Preparations

On April 19th all Juniors are taking the ACT test. Several of our staff members are currently receiving training on how to administer the ACT test. Taking and administering the ACT is very different than taking and administering the NeSA state tests. The ACT is a national test for the use of college admissions and the results of the ACT can have a large impact on college acceptance and college funding.

With this being said ACT is very stringent on the test security and procedures which must be followed when administering the test. All ACT tests throughout the nation must administered in the exact same way in order to keep the test fair and accurate for all students.

Students who are Special Education students on an IEP may receive accommodations, but these accommodations must be approved by ACT.

When school administer the ACT test there cannot be any interruptions, no bells, no passing times nothing that might interrupt the test. The ACT is a timed test and we must follow a structured time table provided to us by ACT.

School on April 19th will follow a "testing day" schedule. School will be dismissed after the testing which will be about 1:00pm. The "testing day will include the following:

7th -8th graders- take NeSA Reading and NeSA Math test

9th graders- Attend College visitation day- CCC and Wayne State

 10^{th} graders- take Pre-ACT test

IIth graders- take the ACT

12th graders- students failing classes must attend to complete assignments

FBLA week kicked off on Saturday February 4th with an ad in the Columbus Telegram. On Monday, February 6th students celebrated FBLA week at our meeting and





- 2. Listen to audiobooks in the car. Turn off the radio, and listen to a book (yes, teacher's still consider that reading). Whether it's a short trip to the grocery store or a weekend visit to grandma's house two hours away, who doesn't love to sit and listen to someone else read to them?
- 3. Pownload audiobooks to an iPod, iPad or Android/iPhone. Did you know that you can download audiobooks from the public library?
- 4. Read aloud during dinner preparations. Ask your child to read to YOU while you're cooking dinner, or better yet take turns cooking and reading to one another. She can read the next chapter in her favorite book or review recipes. To get your family talking about current events at the dinner table, choose to share magazine articles and newspaper headlines.
- 5. Make reading part of your family's daily routine. In many homes, bedtime is the easiest way to fit in reading. But if that doesn't work for you and your family, try a different time maybe first thing in the morning, right after breakfast, waiting for the bus, or directly after school.
- Select a family read aloud. Find a book that appeals to a wide range of ages and read

- Add reading time to your calendar. It might sound forced, but everything else is on your calendar so why not add time to read? Schedule a time each week for the family to stop, drop, and read.






In & Around Christ Lutheran School...


