## From The Superintendent's Desk – By Dr. Plas

This time of year is always tough for superintendents because they are finalizing budgets for the upcoming year. School finances come under the most scrutiny during September because of this process. Schools constantly feel the pressure to ensure their patrons they are using their tax dollars wisely while also providing a high quality education for the kids in the district. This year we put together a 'question-answer' document for patrons addressing many questions or statements that are often heard around budget time. ### ***“Why are my property taxes so high?”***

- Property taxes account for almost 70% of a school district's budget. The other 30% come from state aid, federal aid, county aid, and various taxes.
- Property taxes are the **ONLY** controllable source of income for a school district.
- Nebraska ranks 49<sup>th</sup> in state aid for education in the country.
- Nebraska has the 2<sup>nd</sup> highest property tax percentage in the country.
- The percentage of the Nebraska budget allocated for aid to Nebraska schools has dropped from 32% to 27.4%. This means there are \$190 million LESS dollars given to Nebraska schools than if the percentage stayed the same.
- As the state has funded less for education, they have tried to balance their budget by forcing schools to raise property taxes.
- Lakeview receives \$0 in equalization aid from the state. This means the state has determined LCS has enough resources (property valuation) that we no longer need their equalization aid.

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## ***“School spending is out-of-control!”***

- All Nebraska public school districts adhere to state mandated levy limits as the general fund + building fund maximum levy can't exceed \$1.05. In addition, you only have a certain amount of budget authority based on student enrollment, special education, poverty, etc.
- Nebraska public school district disbursements only grew by an annual average of just 3.5% from 2003-04 through 2013-14.
- During the same 2003-04 through 2013-14 time span, the number of students educated in Nebraska's public schools increased 8.16% from 284,181 to 307,398.
- The percentage of children living in poverty statewide increased from 33.93% to 44.93% during that same decade.
- Payroll accounts for 77.1% of the Lakeview budget. This leaves very little room for 'optional' spending.
- Lakeview spending trends from 2010/11 to 2015/16:
  - General Fund – 1.3% average increase per year
  - Operating Expenses – 1.4% average increase per year

## ***“How do our taxes compare to everyone else?”***

- In 2015-16, Lakeview had the 28<sup>th</sup> lowest levy out of 245 school districts.
- In 2015-16, Lakeview had the 4<sup>th</sup> lowest levy out of 19 ESU7 school districts.
- In 2015-16, Lakeview had the LOWEST levy out of 10 Central Conference school districts.

## ***“What are the district trends at Lakeview?”***

- Valuation has increased from .922 billion to 1.4 billion from 2011-12 to 2015-16 (52.2% increase).
- General Fund tax requests decreased from 90.4¢ to 53.2¢ from 2010-11 to 2015-16 (41.2% decrease).
- Enrollment has increased from 699 to 905 from 2011-12 to 2016-17 (29.5% increase).
- In 2015-16, Lakeview had 38.6% free/reduced lunch students (poverty), 16.7% special education students, and 9.5% English language learners.
- Despite low spending increases we have SPENT more than RECEIVED each of last four years (2012-13 to 2015-16).
- The budget deficit occurred because Lakeview's levy was reduced below the necessary operating expense as a way to redistribute the \$3,000,000 tax injection received from ADM in 2010-11 back to the patrons of the district.
- Lakeview has 34% in reserves compared to a 32% average state-wide for schools our size.

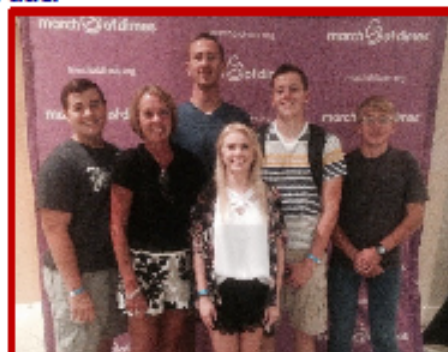

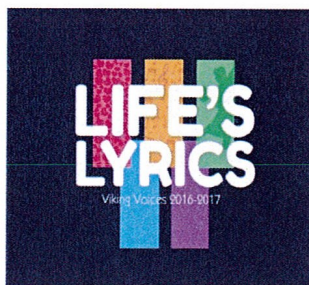

# Notes from Guidance

Dear Students and Parents,

On October 5<sup>th</sup> Lakeview will host its first Apply2College Day. Representatives from Central Community College, Chadron State, Clarkson College, Doane, Joseph's College of Cosmetology, UNK, UNL, UNO, Northeast Community College, Peru State, Wayne State and Nebraska Wesleyan will be in attendance throughout the day to help students complete applications to the colleges of their choice. Other schools may be added at later dates.

Students will need to prepare for the Apply2College day by collecting the materials needed to finish an application. Attached to this newsletter is an Apply2College preparation sheet that will help the students collect the materials to have ready. I will meet with the seniors in preparation to the event to explain how they can sign up to meet the various representatives and to explain what each application will need. The University System schools do have a \$45 application fee so the students applying to UNL, UNK and UNO will need to have access to a credit or debit card.

Scholarship information and applications are now available on the school website under the high school guidance tab. I will add scholarships as I receive them and include the deadline information in the description or name of the scholarship. Students interested in health care professions should apply for one of the RHOP scholarships or the KHOP. Please see me if you have questions about either one.

College and career fair information are now also available on the school website via the high school guidance tab. If you are planning on attending please consider using the bar code system linked to the school's website.

The FAFSA opens October 1<sup>st</sup> which allows students to file for federal financial aid. Help for the financial aid process can be found at <https://www.educationquest.org/resources/fafsa-tools/> You can also call to set up a personal, free appointment to meet with Education Quest to complete your FAFSA. # How to create an FSA ID

The FSA ID (Federal Student Aid ID) is a username and password you create to access the FAFSA and federal student loan websites. It will also serve as your signature for the FAFSA and federal student loans.

**Follow these steps to get your FSA ID.** If you're a dependent student, you and a parent will each need one.

**1. Go to [fsaid.ed.gov](https://fsaid.ed.gov) before you start your FAFSA.**

- Provide your email address and create a username and password. Print this page.

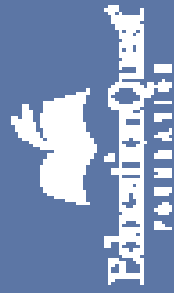
*Both you and a parent will need active email accounts. Don't use a high school email account.*

**2. Enter personal information.**

- Name, Social Security number, date of birth
- Mailing address, email address, phone number

**3. Answer challenge questions.** Select answers that are easy to remember and won't change over time.

**4. Submit your FSA ID information and verify your email address with the assigned security code.**

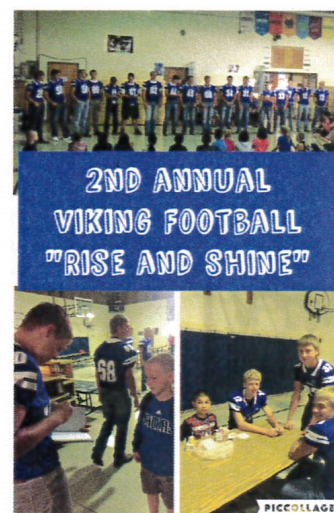


The groups also made get-well cards for a Platte Center resident. They will be delivered throughout the month to cheer her up! Our theme this year is "building bridges" between school and community.

Parent/Student/Teacher compact, student data, and helpful homework tips.

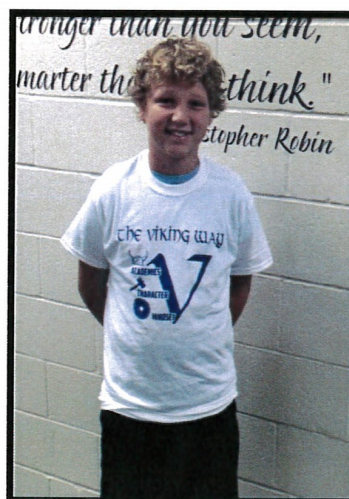

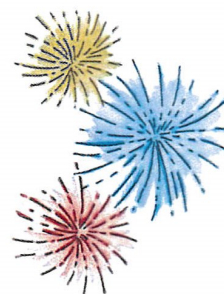

3. The form, letters and photos will be retained by the Lakeview High School Hall of Fame Committee.

### GENERAL CRITERIA

1. The nominee must have been involved in an athletic activity at Lakeview High School in the category for which he or she is nominated.

2. The nominee must have demonstrated high moral character, outstanding citizenship and ideals.

Categorical Criteria:

A. Athlete / High School Achievement: any high school athlete who participated in Lakeview athletics and proved to have superior performance and character. Any such person may not be considered until 10 years after high school graduation.

B. Coach: must have coached for Lakeview High School for a minimum of 5 years and proved to have superior performance and character.

C. Contributor: those whose contributions to Lakeview athletics do not fall into the above mentioned categories. This category could include teachers, administrators, boosters, fans, or someone who made a significant contribution to Lakeview athletics.

D. Team: the Selection Committee each year shall elect a maximum of one team which competed at least 10 years prior to nomination.
