BOOK TALKS WITH YOUR CHILD

Soon your student will be bringing home books to read for enjoyment or required for a class. Books are a great way to connect with your child, and engage them in a good, relationship-building discussion. To avoid the short, yes/no responses, try using these questions to get your child talking about books.

Before your child reads a book, ask:

- Why did you select this book?
- What makes you think this book is going to be interesting?
- What do you think the book is going to be about?
- Does this book remind you of anything you've already read or seen?
- What kind of characters do you think will be in the book?
- What do you think is going to happen?



While your child is reading a book fry asking:

- Will you catch me up on the story? What's happened so far?
- What do you think will happen next?
- If you were that character, what would you have done differently in that situation?
- If the book was a TV show, which actors would you cast in it?
- Where is the book set?
- If the main character in that story lived next door, would you guys be friends?
- What does the place look like in your head as you read? Would you want to visit there?
- Did you learn any new words or facts so far?

After your child has finished a book, ask questions like:

- What was your favorite part of the book? Why?
- Who was your favorite character? Why?
- What was the most interesting thing you learned from the book?
- Why do you think the author wrote this book?
- Would you have ended the book differently? Did it end the way you thought it would?
- Did the problem of the book's plot get solved?
- If you could change one thing in the book, what would you change?

Campus Visit Questions

Want to find the right fit for college? Visit the colleges that interest you, and ask LOTS of questions while you're there.

Ask the admissions representative:

- 1. What are admission requirements and deadlines?
- 2. What is the cost of tuition, fees, room & board, and books?
- 3. What are housing options? Will I be required to live on campus? is there a wait list? Are meal plans required?
- 4. What is the average class size? Are classes taught by professors or graduate assistants?
- 5. I don't know what I plan to study yet; how easy is it to change majors?
- 6. What are "general education" requirements?
- 7. How easy is it to transfer credits from a community college?
- 8. Is there an honors program and how do you qualify?
- is there a campus career center? Are internships available? Job placement services?
- 10. Are there study-abroad opportunities?
- 11. What percentage of students return after their freshman year?
- 12. What percentage of students graduate and what is the average length of study?
- 13. How diverse is the student population?
- 14. What percentage of students are commuters?
- 15. What is the student vs. faculty ratio?
- 16. What kind of tutoring/support systems does the college have?

Note: If you have a disability, ask to meet with the school's disability services coordinator.

Questions about student safety:

- Is there an on-campus health clinic? (Tip: Ask your insurance provider if the campus dinic is "in-network.")
- 2. Where do you refer students who have a serious medical issue?
- 3. How safe is the campus, and what security systems are in place?

Ask your student tour guide or a current student:

Student life:

- Why did you select this school?
- 2. Are the professors accessible?
- 3. How easy or hard was it to get the classes you wanted?
- 4. How many hours a day or week do you study?
- 5. What kind of tutoring/support systems does the college have?



Seniors...it's time to prepare for the early FAFSA!

Beginning **October 1**, you can apply for federal, state and college-based financial aid by completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (<u>FAFSA</u>). This is a change from previous years when students had to wait until after January 1 to apply.

Here's how you can prepare:

Create a Federal Student Aid (FSA) ID for you and one for a parent at <u>fsaid.ed.gov</u>. You and a parent will each need an FSA ID to access and sign the FAFSA.

Be aware of your college's FAFSA priority date. Complete your FAFSA before that date as some financial aid is awarded first come, first served. Contact your college's financial aid office to learn their priority date.

Attend an EducationQuest Financial Aid Program (FAP) to learn about the FAFSA and the financial aid process. If you attend, *you'll be eligible to register for a \$500 scholarship*! FAPs will be held at high schools across the state. Click here for dates and locations.

Attend a College Fair this fall!

This fall, EducationQuest will sponsor five College Fairs across the state.

Before you attend, visit <u>NebraskaCollegeFairs.org</u> to register for a barcode. Print the barcode and take it to the fair so that college reps can scan it. You should also register for a barcode if you plan to attend an Educational Planning Program (see article below).

Meet with college reps at an Educational Planning Program

If you can't make it to a College Fair, attend <u>an Educational Planning Program (EPP) at an area school</u>. These "mini college fairs" feature state and regional colleges along with college planning information.

If you plan to attend an EPP, visit <u>NebraskaCollegeFairs.org</u> to register for a barcode. Print the barcode and take it to the event so that college reps can scan it.

Senior students and parents...start preparing for college admission!

Admission deadlines will start hitting later this fall. Follow these steps to stay on track:

- 1. Contact your top colleges and ask about application deadlines for admission, college-based scholarships and financial aid.
- **2. Visit with college representatives** at <u>College Fairs</u>, <u>Educational Planning Programs</u>, during campus visits, and when they visit your high school.
- **3. Apply to your top 3-4 colleges before the deadline**. Along with your application, the colleges will require your high school transcript, class rank, GPA and ACT/SAT score. They may also request a list of your extracurricular activities, letters of recommendation, an essay, and an interview.
- 4. **Ask if your school is holding an** Apply2College event this fall. If so, you can complete your college applications during the school day and get help from school, college and community volunteers.

September "To Do" List

Juniors and seniors ... complete these college planning tasks during September:

- __ Seniors, create an FSA ID for you and one for a parent at fsaid.ed.gov.
- __ Juniors and seniors, attend a Financial Aid Program.
- ____Juniors and seniors, attend a College Fair or Educational Planning Program (EPP) in your area.
- Before you attend a College Fair or EPP, register for a barcode at NebraskaCollegeFairs.org.
- Seniors, register by September 1 for the October 1 SAT.
- Seniors, register by September 16 for October 22 ACT.
- __ Juniors, ask your school counselor about PSAT registration deadlines and test dates.

Notes from Mrs. Hellbusch...

It's great to be back at school and begin a new year! I look forward to meeting and working with all the students, teachers and families. I will be the kindergarten to eighth grade school counselor. I am available daily to the students, teachers and parents of Lakeview Community Schools. I will make visits to Platte Center Elementary on Monday, Lakeview Junior High on Tuesday and Thursday and Shell Creek on Wednesday and Friday. I will make classroom visits to the kindergarten, first, second, and third grade students first quarter. The topics will address social/ emotional, academic and career topics following the American School Counselor Association's (ASCA) National Model.

Success tip for September:

Create a daily routine. Creating routines for mornings, afternoons, homework and bedtime can create a calm environment for you and your child. To create a routine at your home start by building it around the time your family members need to get up to have enough time to get ready for the day. Allow time to eat breakfast, brush teeth and hair, dress and leave. Plan the night before. Pack school bags and sports bags. Lay out school clothes and any other materials for the day so there is less to do in the morning.

When setting these routines get input from your family members - when each person has a say in these routines, it will be easier for everyone to stick to it! If there is an area that is difficult for your child to stick to, I encourage you to create a positive reinforcement chart or reward chart. This positive reinforcement will encourage task completion with less frustration. When you first begin a routine talk your family through each of the steps and practice them. Within a few weeks, your child will be reminding you of the routines!

Welcome Back!

Welcome to the 2016-2017 School Year! I'm excited to begin the year and continue to build relationships with those in the Lakeview Community. In my short time at Shell Creek Elementary, it has easy to see that we have an excellent staff! I've been impressed with the professionalism and dedication of our staff. I can assure you that your child will be given a top notch education provided by a group of caring individuals.

Key Dates:

August 16th Open House 5:30-7:00

August 17th First Day of School 8:05-11:25 (breakfast will be served from 7:30-8:00) Please have your child either go directly to the cafeteria for breakfast or to the gymnasium first thing each morning. I will dismiss students to their classrooms.

Drop Off:

When dropping your child off in the morning, please follow the arrows and **use only the west side of the school.** No student entry will be allowed on the east side of the school. Please enter from the dirt road west of the parking lot and drop off with your vehicle facing north. Use the lane closest to the school to drop off your child. If you need to get out of your vehicle to assist your child or meet with school personnel, please use the parking lot. When picking up your child, please use both the east and west sides of the school. We prefer K-2 students to leave the building from the east while 3-6 students will leave from the west. Family accommodations will be made.

Tips:

Lastly, I want to encourage you to partner with us in increasing the academic progress of your child. Some tips include:

- 1. Limiting the amount of 'screen' time you allow for your child each day. (One colleague mentioned that he would only allow screen time equal to the amount of time they spent outside playing)
- 2. Making sure that your child follows a set bedtime (9-11 hours of sleep is recommended for students ages 6 to 13).
- 3. Supporting your child's reading at home (simply 15-20 minutes at home each night can really pay off over the course of the year!!)
- 4. Providing a quiet place for your child to do homework.
- 5. Encouraging your child to ask the teacher for help. This is tough for some students to do, but is a good life skill to develop.
- 6. Reinforcing expectations that your child follows school rules and listens to adults.

I look forward to an outstanding school year!
