From The Superintendent's Desk — By Dr. Plas

This time of year is always tough for school districts as they are finalizing budgets for the upcoming year. School finances come under the most scrutiny during September because of this process. Schools constantly feel the pressure to ensure their patrons they are using their tax dollars wisely while also providing a high quality education for the kids in the district. We put together a 'question-answer' document for patrons addressing many questions or statements that are often heard around budget time. If you have budget questions beyond the ones highlighted below, please do not hesitate to call me at 402-564-8518.

"Why are my property taxes so high?"

Property taxes account for almost 75% of Lakeview's budget. The other 25% is received from state aid, federal aid, county aid, and various local taxes.

Property taxes are the ONLY controllable source of income for a school district.

Nebraska ranks 49th in state aid for education in the country.

Nebraska has the 2^{nd} highest property tax percentage in the country and the 7^{th} highest effective property taxes in the country.

The percentage of the Nebraska budget allocated for aid to Nebraska schools has dropped from 32% to 27.4%. This means there are \$190 million LESS dollars given to Nebraska schools than if the percentage stayed the same.

As the state has funded less for education, they have tried to balance their budget by forcing schools to raise property taxes.

<u>Lakeview receives \$0 in equalization aide from the state.</u> This means the state has determined LCS has enough resources (property valuation) that we no longer need their equalization aide.

"School spending is out-of-control!"

All Nebraska public school districts adhere to state mandated levy limit lids as the general fund + building fund maximum levy can't exceed \$1.05. In addition, you only have a certain amount of budget authority based on student enrollment, special education, poverty, etc.

Nebraska public school district disbursements only grew by an annual average of just 3.5% from 2003-04 through 2013-14.

During the same 2003-04 through 2013-14 time span, the number of students educated in Nebraska's public schools increased 8.16% from 284,181 to 307,398.

The percentage of children living in poverty statewide increased from 33.93% to 44.93% during that same decade.

Payroll accounts for 79% of the Lakeview budget. This leaves very little room for 'optional' spending.

Lakeview spending trends from 2009/10 to 2016/17:

General Fund – 0.77% average increase per year

Lakeview spending increase just 0.07% from 2015-16 to 2016-17!

"How do our taxes compare to everyone else?"

In 2016-17, Lakeview had the 58th lowest levy out of 245 school districts.

In 2016-17, Lakeview had the 7th lowest levy out of 19 ESU7 school districts.

In 2016-17, Lakeview had 2nd lowest levy out of 10 Central Conference school districts.

"What are the district trends at Lakeview?"

Valuation has increased from .922 billion to 1.5 billion from 2011-12 to 2016-17 (62.7% increase).

General Fund tax requests decreased from 90.4 cents to 60.8 cents from 2010-11 to 2016-17 (32.7% decrease).

Enrollment has increased from 644 to 887 from 2013-14 to 2016-17 (37.7% increase).

In 2016-17, Lakeview had 42.9% free/reduced lunch students (poverty), 17.0% special education students, and 11.4% English language learners.

The total district levy from 2016-17 to 2017-18 will remain at 65.5 cents.

"What is Lakeview doing to help relieve my property tax burden?"

It is our hope that Lakeview can be on the forefront of legislation that could help balance the taxing stool (income, property, sales) while still appropriately funding our public education system.

Lakeview is a member of the *Nebraskans United* group which is a coalition comprised of education and agriculture groups that are working together to provide some property tax relief. That group has two guiding principles:

Adequate and sustainable funding of high quality K-12 education is imperative for the future of Nebraska

A well educated work force is essential for economic development and a high quality of life.

Education reduces poverty, boosts economic growth, and increases income. In sum, education is one of the most important investments a state can make in its people and future.

Low levels of state funding for education are at the heart of Nebraska's property tax issues, not school spending.

Tax reform which reduces the over-reliance on local property taxes is necessary to balance the tax burden with all Nebraska taxpayers

Nebraskans must reduce property taxes to ensure a fair and balanced system.

Nebraska ranks 49^{th} in country in the percentage of K-12 funding from the state

Nebraskans pay the 7th highest effective property tax rate in the nation

To fund the state budget, we need a tax system that is fair and balanced for all Nebraska taxpayers. Nebraska's taxpayers need a significant reduction in property taxes.

Nebraska K-12 schools receive 33% of their funding from state sources while the national average is 47%.

Nebraska K-12 schools receive 49% of their funding from local property taxes while the national average is 29%.

In addition, Lakeview has recently joined the group Standing Together for All Nebraska Children's Education (STANCE)

STANCE is a legislative group with mission objections that include providing equity and opportunity to all students, being open and transparent, educating policy makers regarding real effect of policies including clarifying the purpose of the state aid formula, advocating for policy that is understandable and predictable which promotes cooperation and common ground needs for member schools, and developing and maintain relationships with policy makers based on trust.

It's FAFSA time!

Beginning October 1, you and your parents can complete the 2018-19 <u>FAFSA</u> (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). The FAFSA is the application for state, federal, and college-based financial aid.

Follow these tips to prepare:

Create a Federal Student Aid (FSA) ID for you and one for a parent at <u>fsaid.ed.gov</u>. You and a parent will each need an FSA ID to access and sign the FAFSA.

Attend an EducationQuest Financial Aid Program (FAP) to learn about the FAFSA and the financial aid process. If you attend, *you'll be eligible to register for a \$500 scholarship*! FAPs are happening at high schools across the state. <u>Olick here</u> for dates and locations.

Review the FAFSA Checklist at EducationQuest.org to determine items you'll need to complete the FAFSA.

Winning the scholarship game

Follow these tips to increase your chances of earning scholarships:

Don't pay for scholarship services! Free resources include <u>ScholarshipQuest</u> at EducationQuest.org, your school counselor's office, and EducationQuest offices in Omaha, Lincoln, and Kearney.

Focus on college-based and local scholarships. You're more likely to earn them over large national awards.

Continually update your activities, honors, and volunteer or paid jobs using the <u>Activities Resume</u> at EducationQuest.org.

Earn the best possible ACT/SAT scores by taking the exams in the spring of your junior year and again in the fall of your senior year.

Use quality references such as a teacher, coach or counselor. Give them advance notice, a specific deadline, and a copy of your Activities Resume.

Ask at least two people to proofread your application.





Babies and young children are drawn to bright colors and funny stories in books. But the older kids get, the more reading is just another thing to add to their already long list of tasks. Below are a few ideas to get your teen back into books!

- Find the "why" in YA. YA (young adult) novels tackle the edgy issues teens struggle with, from peer pressure and romantic longing to grief and trouble at home or school.
 Whether they're personally grappling with these issues or seeking vicarious thrills, teens gravitate toward subject matter that's relatable. Check the YA bestseller lists.
- Lure 'em with adult books. Find nonfiction titles on subjects your teen's curious about, such as climate change, race, political corruption, or true crime. Check adult nonfiction bestseller lists to see what's catching fire. Funny adult books also work (by David Sedaris or Tina Fey, for example), as do horror (Stephen King), mysteries (Agatha Christie), thrillers (James Patterson, John Grisham), fantasy (George R.R. Martin), science fiction (Isaac Asimov), and sports (Michael Lewis).
- Let them listen. Spark teens' interest by getting an audiobook to listen to on the way to school or on long drives. Let them download audiobooks to their smartphones. (They won't risk looking uncool, because they'll be

under headphones or have their earbuds in.)





- Model reading. Read at home where your teens can see you. Talk about what you're reading, and express your
 enjoyment. Always take a book or magazine along when you go to the beach or face waiting in a long line. Send
 your teen the message that reading is a pleasure, not a chore.
- **Keep reading material around.** Kids who grow up with lots of books around tend to read more. Stock the bathroom, car, dining table -- wherever there's a captive audience -- with comic books, graphic novels, and magazines geared to your teens' interests; first books in hit YA series; or classic sci-fi and mysteries. There's nothing wrong with "micro-reading."
- Give the gift of reading. Hand your teen a gift card to your local bookstore. They'll discover the treasure-hunt fun of looking for a good book.

<u>Dave Prokesh</u> was this years inductee in the category of coach. He coached and taught at Lakeview for 21 years from 1989 to 2009. During that time he coached 46 seasons in 4 different sports. As the first Head Coach of softball (1996-2009) he built a power house program that qualified for the state tournament 10 times, was the Class C State Champion in 2006, Class C State Runner-up in 2002, had 9 top-5 finishes, 14 Central Conference Tournament or regular season championships, and 38 tournament championships. With a 278-102 record at Lakeview, and a 356-119 career record, Prokesh ranks in the Top 10 in Nebraska high school softball history in both total wins and winning percentage. He coached 19 - First Team All-State, 11 - Second Team All-State, and 26 - First Team All-Central Conference players. Twenty-five of his athletes went on to play at the collegiate level and/or coach softball. Dave's coaching awards include: 2006 Nebraska Coaches Association Coach-of-the-Year and 2005 coach in the

All-Star Game. As Head Wrestling 1989 to 2003; he coached 42 state qualifiers, 13 state place winners, two state champions, and his 1995 team finished in 10th place at the State, all school records at the time. Coach Prokesh was a freshman football coach for six years and was also an assistant varsity track coach for 12 years, where he coached numerous state qualifiers as well.

Myra Osten was inducted in the category of contributor. Imagine being a stranger walking through the front doors of Lakeview High School and stepping into the office area. After a brief conversation, you are more than a little confused - was the lady with whom you spoke the office manager, the public relations director for the high school, or the organizational manager for every club and organization associated with the school? The answer - all of the above because you just met Myra Osten. Myra was not merely a patron and supporter of the school district, she knew every student who came into the office by name, who their parents were, and where they lived. She was without a doubt, the "heartbeat" of Lakeview High School. During Myra's thirty-six year tenure at Lakeview High School she not only served as the Administrative Assistant to the Superintendent and secretary of the school board, but also sponsored various clubs and was especially active in the school's FFA

organization. Myra lost her battle with breast cancer on October 10, 2010, but her Lakeview legacy will live in our hearts forever.

Lakeview High School athlete inductee were:



Tina Wurdeman-Bennett was Lakeview's first female Class B State Champion track athlete. She excelled in all of her athletic endeavors garnering nine athletic letters and numerous accolades. The pinnacle of Tena's athletic career was as a thinclad, qualifying for state in eight events, medaling twice. Tena was the 2nd leading team scorer as a freshman with 109.83 points qualifying for state in the 100 meter, 200 meter, and long jump. Her junior year state championship time in the 200 was 26.4 seconds. Her long jump of 17'6 ¼ " set a school record that still stands, earning 3rd place at state. Tena also competed at state in the 4x100 and the 4x400 meter relays. As a senior, Tena qualified in long jump. Tena earned two varsity letters in volleyball and three letters in basketball. She was named to the *Lincoln Journal Star* Academic All-State Team as a junior and senior in volleyball and as a senior in basketball. Her senior basketball stats include 11.3 points and 5.9 rebounds per game. Tena was named

to the All Central 10 Conference 1st team in basketball and played on the CCC All-Star volleyball and basketball teams. Tena was the 1994 Lakeview Booster Club and Sertoma Female Athlete of the Year, Women's Scholar Athlete, and the KLIR Prep Club Award recipient. She earned scholarships to Northwest Missouri State where she competed in volleyball and track.



<u>Dusty Jura</u> began his Lakeview athletic career as a freshman three sport varsity letter winner, participating in football, basketball, and soccer. During his freshman year, Jura started for the basketball team which qualified for the state tournament for the first time in over 20 years. In football, he was the Viking's starting punter and was a defenseman for the soccer team. Jura experienced most of his success in basketball. During his four years, the team qualified for the state tournament three times, with a championship and runner-up finish his junior and senior years, respectively. Both these years, Jura was the leading scorer in the state tournament for all classes. His achievements included being twice named the Class C1 Player of the Year in basketball. He was also named to the All-Class Super State First Team during his senior year. Aside from basketball, Jura was selected Class C1

All-State First Team in football during his senior year. He also finished his football career as the school's all-time leading receiver and held numerous punting and kicking records. After graduating from Lakeview, Jura continued his basketball career at the University of Nebraska Kearney.



<u>Jeff Lake</u> was a three sport athlete whose resume included ten varsity letters and All-Conference recognition in all three sports – an accomplishment that is rarely achieved. In a time when specialization was emerging, it is amazing that Jeff's flexibility as an athlete led him to achieve All-Conference honors in football as a punter, back, and receiver AND to qualify for the state track meet in four events! In football and basketball, Jeff was a three-year letter winner and was named First Team All-Conference in football three years and basketball as a junior and a senior. In track, as a freshman, he qualified in the pole vault. As a sophomore, he qualified in the 100 and 200 meter, pole vault, and high jump. As a junior, he qualified in the 100 meter, placing 3rd in Class B, the 200 meter, placing 2nd in Class B, pole vault, and high


jump. In his senior year, with a pulled hamstring, he qualified in the 100 and 200 meter. Upon graduation, Jeff held Lakeview track records in the 100 meter, 200 meter, high jump, pole vault, and single season scoring! In 1993 Jeff was chosen as the Tom Vandenberg Memorial Award recipient and the KLIR Prep Athlete of the Year. Following graduation, Jeff walked on to the Husker football team and became one of the few athletes in collegiate history to be awarded three National Championship rings (1994, 1995, and 1997). He was a two-year starter, four-year letter winner, and received First Team Academic All-Conference honors as a wide receiver.
