Seniors...It's decision time!

Here's how to make your final college decision.

Compare your college acceptance letters, financial aid award notifications, and campus visit notes. List the pros and cons of each school using the following criteria:

Location – Is the college too close? If you come home every weekend, you won't experience true campus life. Is the college too far away? If so, you may not make it home as often as you'd like.

Cost – Can your family afford the school? What can you expect for financial aid beyond your freshman year? Did you receive renewable scholarships? How much in <u>student and parent loans</u> will you need to borrow to cover expenses?

Academic program – Which college offers the degree program that best fits your career interests? What happens if you change majors? Does the college offer other degree programs that interest you?

Student life – Does the school offer activities you will enjoy? Do you like the living arrangements provided by the school? Will you have an opportunity to work on or near campus?

Make your final decision by **May 1** and then notify the colleges you're rejecting so they can offer your spot, and financial aid, to another student.

Juniors... these questions will help you narrow your college choices

By narrowing your college choices now, you'll be better prepared to apply for financial aid and college admission early next fall. Start by answering these questions.

What do you want to study?

Explore your <u>career interests</u> and then research colleges that offer programs in areas you may want to pursue. Use college selection tools like <u>College Profiles</u> at **EducationQuest.org**.

What kind of school do you want to attend?

Do you prefer a large university or a small college? Are you interested in a community college? What kind of student/teacher ratio do you want?

Where do you want to go to college?

Do you want to live close to home or far away? Do you want to be in a major city or a small town? How big of a factor is out-of-state or private school tuition? If you want to go out of state, investigate programs like the Midwest Student Exchange Program which may provide discounted tuition.

What can you afford?

Consider overall costs: tuition, room and board, books, transportation, and personal expenses. (See "<u>About Nebraska Colleges</u>" for costs.) Determine what you and your parents can afford to pay out-of-pocket and plan to apply for financial aid to help make up the difference. Calculate <u>the loan debt</u> you and your parents may need to incur to pay for your college education.

Your Journey to College Begins with Us

Lakeview Speech Team Captures Second Straight State Runner-Up Title

While climbing the same stage where she had joined her team to receive a trophy just a year before, Lakeview High School junior Madison Schwarz felt pride in knowing that this time was different.

All of the school's competitors at last week's NSAA State Speech Tournament in Kearney felt it too. For the second straight year, the Lakeview speech team earned the title of Class B runner-up. For the second straight year, they finished behind Central Conference rival York. This time, however, they needed to do it without a single returning state medalist.

And from the beginning, they knew that they would have to do it collectively.

"Coach told us before the season that we have never gone backwards, so together we were determined to not only sustain last year's success, but to get even better as a team," said Schwarz, who was the team's leading point earner by placing fourth in Serious Interpretation and third in Persuasive Speaking.

Thursday's results speak to that determination. The Viking speakers cut champion York's margin of victory down by 40 points from the previous year, and—after finishing tied for the second spot in 2017—distanced themselves from third-place Gering by 16 points. They attribute the gains to becoming more balanced as a team

"On paper it might look the same, but last year we had just three people, all seniors, place at the very top of their four events" said Junior Savanna Denton, who by finishing fourth in Persuasive Speaking joined a group of nine Lakeview students who placed a total of seven events. "We might not have all gotten the rankings we wanted individually, but as a team we showed that Lakeview is a force."

Individually, though, a number of Lakeview speakers had a remarkable day. This includes Senior Madelyn Hogeland, the recipient of a fifth place medal in Informative Speaking and a third place medal in Interpretation of Poetry.

"Before this year, just placing at state in any event would have exceeded my

expectations," Hogeland said. "But placing in two and contributing to my team's state runner-up trophy makes me very happy."

Another Senior, Kathleen Howland, believes her fifth place finish in Entertainment Speaking will serve as a reminder of how to overcome adversity.

"It shows that I can do anything I put my mind to no matter how rough it is at the start," said Howland, referencing her early-season struggles in the event. "I will never forget the walk to the stage to receive my medal. It was amazing."

Howland also medaled in Oral Interpretation of Drama (OID), a group event that is akin to a short play. The five-person group consisted of herself, fellow senior Dylan Arends, juniors Emily Cunningham and Madison Mahoney, and sophomore Ethan Goldfish Vinson. Each credits the team's culture of hard work for their fourth place finish in the event. Vinson estimates that the time the OID group spent practicing together throughout the season topped 100 hours.

"There were some nights we spent hours trying to perfect the staging of a single scene," said Vinson. "It just shows that hard work truly pays off."

For the 25 member team, bringing another trophy to the halls of Lakeview is a satisfying cap to a season that began in October. For those returning next year, however, the achievement does not signal an opportunity to relax.

"We have so much potential to do more," said Schwarz. "We are ready to push on and work harder to make it happen."

If she and her teammates find themselves climbing that same stage again in 2019, their hope is to realize yet another goal—to take one step further.



What's New with the FISH!!

Platte Center students in grades 4-6 are once again enjoying rainbow trout in the classroom. This program is sponsored by the Nebraska Game and Parks.
