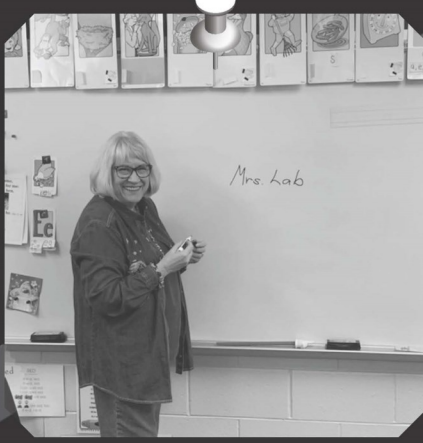


## ARTIST OF THE MONTH

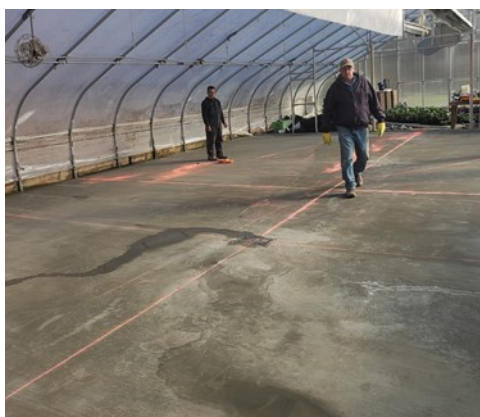
### December Chapter Meeting

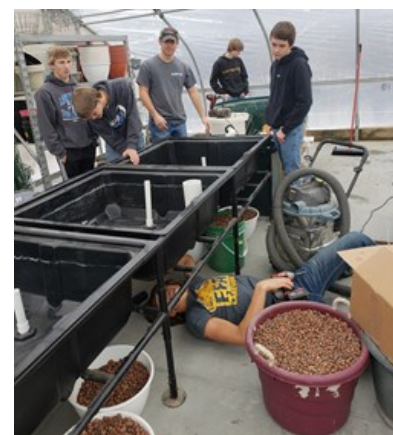

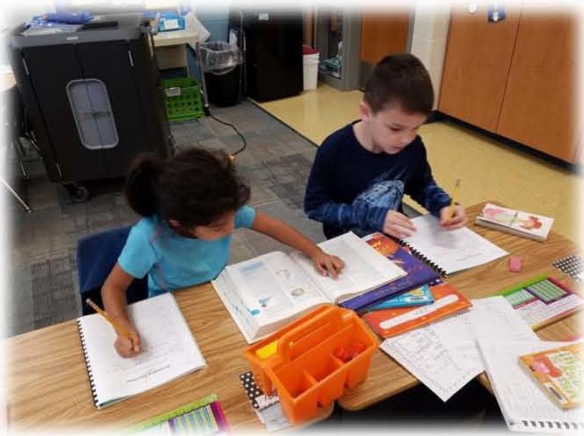
