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# In & Around the Jr/Sr High School...



## New this year! Level 3 ISDF

Below are the procedures for ISDF. Please review and note that we have added a Level 3 ISDF to help support students who are struggling. We understand that sometime people make appointments for the early out Wednesday's please make sure your child does not have to attend Level 3 ISDF if you have made an appointment. Students are expected to attend Level ISDF if they are failing multiple subjects. See details below.

## "Increase Success, Decrease Failure"

**Purpose:** The purpose of the "ISDF" period is to provide students who are struggling in academics the time, motivation, and support to improve their grades, and experience success.

**Goal:** To increase student achievement and reduce the number of students failing in academics.

### **How it works?**

The ISDF period is intended to use three components to increase student success: 1.) Time 2.) Motivation and 3.) Support.

### **Three Levels to ISDF:**

**Level 1-** Students who are on the failing list, in at least one subject, are required to attend Level 1, ISDF. Viking Time will run from 3:22-3:37PM, on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. Viking Time functions as a study period and/or activity meeting period on M,T,W.

- On Thursday and Friday, students who are on the failing list in at least one subject must attend their ISDF period, which runs from 3:22-3:37PM.
- Students in Level 1, ISDF are assigned to attend their regular Viking Time room with their Viking Time teacher. Viking Time teachers are responsible for helping their students get off the failing list. Level 1, ISDF provides the extra time for struggling students to get caught up on school work, ask teachers questions, and receive individual support in their academics.
- Students who are not on the failing list are free to leave on Thursday and Friday after 8<sup>th</sup> period at 3:19PM.

**Level 2-** Level 2, ISDF will provide more time and support to the students who need it most. Students who are required to attend Level 2, ISDF must attend ISDF during their Viking Time from Tuesday through the following Monday.

- Students who are on the failing list in 2 classes or more are required to attend Level 2, ISDF.

- Students in Level 2, ISDF will not attend their regular Viking Time, but are assigned to a Level 2, ISDF teacher. The assigned teachers are as follows:
  - Mrs. Schatz- 7<sup>th</sup>/8<sup>th</sup> grade
  - Mrs. Blaser- 9<sup>th</sup> grade
  - Mrs. Miller- 10<sup>th</sup> grade
  - Mrs. Krienke- 11<sup>th</sup> grade
  - Mrs. Schaad- 12<sup>th</sup> grade
- Level 2 teachers will help students prioritize assignments. Arrangements will be made on Thursday and Friday for students to work with teachers in classes they are failing.
- Students in Level 2, ISDF are not allowed to leave for meetings or activities during the Level 2, ISDF time frame. Their first priority is to become eligible for the activity in which they participate.
- Level 2, ISDF runs from 3:22-3:37, **Tuesday through the following Monday**. Students have the option to stay until 4:00 to work on assignments with their Level 2 teacher.

## New this year for 9-12 students! LEVEL 3 ISDF!!

**Level 3 ISDF**- Level 3, ISDF will increase the amount of time and intervention needed to support students.

- Students who continue to fail multiple subjects 2 or more will attend Level 3 ISDF.
- Students who are failing multiple subjects when the failing list comes out on the week of the 2nd early out Wednesday of each month are required to stay for Level 3 ISDF.
- Level 3 ISDF is on the 2<sup>nd</sup> early out Wednesday of each month.
- Students failing multiple subjects must attend Level 3 ISDF which runs from 1:40-3:30pm. If a student completes their assignments before 3:30 and it is approved by their teacher, students may be dismissed from Level 3 ISDF.

It is very important that we keep your child's information up-to-date in the event your child would get sick or there was an emergency at school. Please contact your child's school office if you have any contact information/address changes.

# ONE OPPORTUNITY. LIMITLESS POSSIBILITIES.

If you want to play sports at an NCAA Division I or II school, start by registering for a Certification Account with the NCAA Eligibility Center at [eligibilitycenter.org](http://eligibilitycenter.org). If you want to play Division III sports or you aren't sure where you want to compete, start by creating a Profile Page at [eligibilitycenter.org](http://eligibilitycenter.org).

## ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

To play sports at a Division I or II school, you must graduate from high school, complete 16 NCAA-approved core courses, earn a minimum GPA and earn an ACT or SAT score that matches your core-course GPA.

## CORE COURSES

Visit [eligibilitycenter.org/courselist](http://eligibilitycenter.org/courselist) for a full list of your high school's approved core courses. Complete 16 core courses in the following areas:

### DIVISION I

Complete 10 NCAA core courses, including seven in English, math or natural/physical science, before your seventh semester.

## GRADE-POINT AVERAGE

The NCAA Eligibility Center calculates your grade-point average (GPA) based on the grades you earn in NCAA-approved core courses.

- DI requires a minimum 2.3 GPA.
- DII requires a minimum 2.2 GPA.

## SLIDING SCALE

Divisions I and II use sliding scales to match test scores and GPAs to determine eligibility. The sliding scale balances your test score with your GPA. If you have a low test score, you need a higher GPA to be eligible. Find more information about sliding scales at [ncaa.org/student-athletes/future/test-scores](http://ncaa.org/student-athletes/future/test-scores).

## TEST SCORES

Take the ACT or SAT as many times as you want before you enroll full time in college, but remember to list the NCAA Eligibility Center (code 9999) as a score recipient whenever you register to take a test. If you take a test more than once, send us all your scores and we will use the best scores from each test section to create your sum score. We accept official scores only from the ACT or SAT, and won't use scores shown on your high school transcript.





# HIGH SCHOOL TIMELINE

## GRADE 9

### Plan

- Start planning now! Take the right courses and earn the best grades you can.
- Ask your counselor for a list of your high school's NCAA core courses to make sure you take the right classes. Or, find your high school's list of NCAA core courses at [eligibilitycenter.org/courselist](http://eligibilitycenter.org/courselist).

## GRADE 10

### Register

- Register for a Certification Account or Profile Page with the NCAA Eligibility Center at [eligibilitycenter.org](http://eligibilitycenter.org).
- If you fall behind on courses, don't take shortcuts to catch up. Ask your counselor for help with finding approved courses or programs you can take.

## GRADE 11

### Study

- Check with your counselor to make sure you are on track to graduate on time.
- Take the ACT or SAT, and make sure we get your scores by using code **9999**.
- At the end of the year, ask your counselor to upload your official transcript.

## GRADE 12

### Graduate

- Take the ACT or SAT again, if necessary, and make sure we get your scores by using code **9999**.
- Request your final amateurism certification after April 1.
- After you graduate, ask your counselor to upload your final official transcript with proof of graduation.

### Core Courses

This simple formula will help you meet Divisions I and II core-course requirements.

$$4 \times 4 = 16$$

- + 4 English courses (one per year)
- + 4 math courses (one per year)
- + 4 science courses (one per year)
- + 4 social science courses (one per year)

**= 16 NCAA CORE COURSES**

- ☐ Retake the ACT and/or SAT. Colleges use your best score for admission and scholarship consideration.

- ☐ Submit your housing deposit before the deadline.
- ☐ Register for new-student orientation at your college.
- ☐ Apply for a summer job. Save as much as you can for college.



### SUMMER

- ☐ Attend new-student orientation at your college.
- ☐ Apply for student loans, if needed. Your college will tell you how to apply.
- ☐ Set up a budget that will help you manage your money while you're in college.
- ☐ Coordinate dorm purchases with your roommate.
