Agriscience, Nursery and landscape, Farm Management, Ag sales, Ag Mechanics, and Vet Science all ranked at the top portion of their events which qualified them for state. 
That led us into a fun geography project with him! The children brought home their own Flat Stanley to send to anyone or anyplace for a little adventure.

Articulation: Does my child need speech services?

Developing speech and language skills is a difficult task. It is natural for young children to make mistakes when they are learning to speak. There is often a false belief that any child who is difficult to understand is delayed in his/her speech development and needs to see a speech-language pathologist. In general most young children are exhibiting age-appropriate sound errors and need a little more time for speech development. Most children eventually drop errors in their speech and develop normal speech patterns. Some children continue to make errors behond the age when other children have mastered those sounds.

It may be time to have your child's speech assessed by a speech-language pathologist if you observe one or more of the following:

- 1. Family members or friends have a hard time understanding your child.
- 2. Your child demonstrates frustration because you don't understand his/her speech.
- 3. Your child shows no sign of frustration when trying to communicate, but you do not understand his/her speech.

The process of knowing whether or not your child needs therapy begins by paying close attention to what sounds your child is having difficulty saying. If you notice that your child consistently substitutes sounds (ex. "Pid" for "pig"), then you can refer to resources such as the below chart and find at what age most children develop a particular sound (ex. The /g/ sound develops by age 3).

If you have questions about your child's speech and language development, contact your school and ask to speak with the speech-language pathologist. Mrs. Briggs serves Shell Creek and Mrs. Werner serves Platte Center and Lakeview Jr/Sr High.

The chart below gives general guidelines of sound mastery. You can refer to this when you are wondering about your child's speech development.





Benefits of Multi-Age Grouping in Preschool

- Children are viewed as unique individuals. The teacher focuses on teaching each child according to his or her own strengths, unlike in same-grade classrooms that often expect all children to be at the same place at the same time with regard to ability.
- Children are not labeled according to their ability, and children learn at their own rate.
- Children develop a sense of family with their classmates. They become a "family of learners" who support and care for each other.
- Older children have the opportunity to serve as mentors and to take leadership roles.
- Children are more likely to cooperate than compete. The spirit of cooperation and caring makes it possible for children to help each other as individuals, not see each other as competitors.
- Older children model more sophisticated approaches to problem solving, and younger children are able to accomplish tasks they could not do without the assistance of older children. This dynamic increases the older child's level of independence and competence.
- Children are invited to take charge of their learning, by making choices at centers and with project work. This sense of "ownership" and self-direction is the foundation for lifelong learning.
- Children have almost an extra month of teaching time, because the teacher does not have to spend the early weeks in the school year getting to know each child.
- Children are exposed to positive models for behavior and social skills.
