



From The Superintendent's Desk — By Dr. Plas

March is here! I love the hope and enthusiasm that March brings when people start getting outside, the days get longer, and the doldrums of winter become a distant memory. In education, March is the month we begin to think about not only finishing the year strong but preparing to be even better next year. With that mind, we wanted to provide an update on the latest happenings with the Lakeview Jr./Sr. High project, elementary school improvements, and curriculum changes:

- Lakeview Jr./Sr. High Project
 - The final phases of construction will take place starting in early March and finalizing by the time school starts in 2021-22.
 - Starting on March 5th, all of the doors on the west side of the building will be closed. They will close the northwest door by the current Ag/IT classrooms to begin construction on the new Agriculture Lab.
 - The only doors available for entrance/exit will be the front door and a door located by the weight room/cafeateria. We realize this will be an inconvenience, but ask for everyone's understanding as it was necessary to ensure construction is completed on time.
 - Gyms/Weight Room/Wrestling Room will all be available throughout the summer for open gyms, camps, etc.
 - This summer they will finalize the new activities area/gymnasium, finalize classroom remodels in the older part of the building that weren't completed last summer, remodel the current Ag/IT labs into a state of the art Industrial Technology Lab, and construct the brand new Agriculture Lab/classroom.
 - The construction project continues to go well and we are so excited to finalize all construction before the start of next school year. We appreciate everyone's understanding and flexibility over the last year!
- Elementary Buildings
 - Remodeling of the 2nd grade room at Platte Center
 - Resealing the roof at Platte Center
 - Replacing one air conditioning unit at Platte Center
- Curriculum
 - Lakeview will be upgrading technology in the district to allow a one-to-one initiative at the start of the 2021-22 school year. More information on the one-to-one initiative will be provided at the end of the year and during the summer. This will be a significant instructional step forward starting next year!
 - Potential textbook adoption for Health/PE will be done for the 2021-22 school year.

As you can see, we are continuing our commitment to providing our students with an excellent education and updated facilities. Improvement and growth are the most critical aspects of education, and we are committed to that both in the classroom and with LCS facilities!

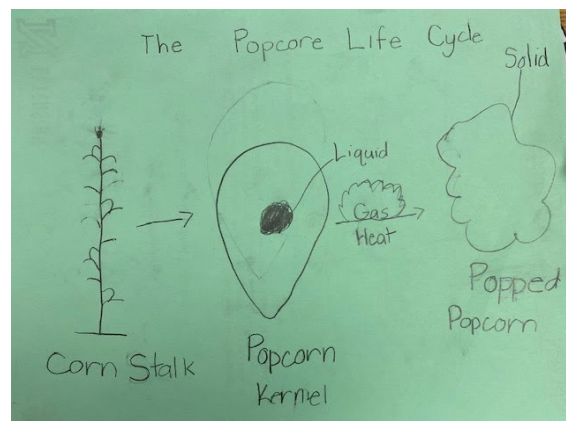

Positively Popcorn 2nd Grade Mrs. Osten

Did you know that Nebraska is one of the leading states in producing popcorn? Nebraska grows nearly 250 million pounds of popcorn per year! Alisha Meusch from the Platte County Extension Office came to help the students describe the physical properties of matter and how it changes through... **POPCORN!** She read a book to the students, let them watch it pop (and of course eat it!), watched a video of popcorn popping in slow motion, and finally they drew the life cycle of popcorn. The students learned how the three stages of matter: solids, liquids, and gases are all present when we pop popcorn!



Revamped HAL Program Brings Excitement

Do you have a 3rd-6th grade student asking about HAL? Your first question is probably, "What is HAL?" While the HAL (High Ability Learner) program is not new to Shell Creek or Platte Center, the scope of learning is. Students who have been identified for HAL meet during the school day and participate in challenging activities that go beyond classroom curriculum such as coding and STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math) projects. After recent MAPs testing, over ten additional students at both elementary schools have qualified to participate. It has been an exciting time for both students and teachers alike.



When children are starting to learn to read there are 5 components that they will learn to help them become successful readers. The 5 components to reading are phonics, phonemic awareness, vocabulary, fluency, and reading comprehension. As a teacher we focus on these 5 areas. We look at students' strengths and weaknesses in reading. All five areas are different but build on each other to help students' become sufficient readers.

First, phonics is connecting sounds and letters to make words. To help students' and myself remember what phonics is, is to remember you have to have the lights on to do this. You have to be able to see the letters on a page and connect it with a sound to create a word. Then, phonemic awareness, this is only the sounds of letters. You can have the lights off, you only need to hear those sounds. Next, vocabulary, this is very important as a reader. Being able to identify the meaning of the words will help a reader understand what the story is about. Then, fluency is the pace the reader is reading a story. If they can connect sounds to letters and read the whole words they will be able to read more fluent and be able to read the words correctly. Last, reading comprehension is remembering what they read. This is hard for students' because they focus on reading the words correctly and fluent that they do not always remember what they read. When reading with your child remember to ask questions and have them explain what they are reading.
