Acceptance Month (Information from Autism Society of America)

April has widely been known as “Autism Awareness Month” in the United States as a way to empower autistic individuals and their families. This year, the autism community is calling for a shift in language to match the growing need for acceptance within the community. This April, we recognize “Autism Acceptance Month”. Autism community advocates are using the term “acceptance” as a means of more fully integrating those 1 in every 54 Americans living with autism into our social fabric.

Autism is a complex, lifelong developmental disability that can impact a person’s social skills, communication, relationships, and self-regulation. It is a “spectrum condition” that affects people differently and to varying degrees. If you are concerned about your child, please reach out to your school’s classroom teacher, resource teacher, or speech-language pathologist. An educational determination is made by a multidisciplinary evaluation team of various school professionals. The evaluation results are reviewed to determine whether a student qualifies for special education and related services under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). While there is currently no know single cause of autism, early diagnosis helps a person receive the support and services that they need, which can lead to a quality life filled with opportunity.

Hi, my name is Karlee Wright and I am a second year teacher from Hastings, Nebraska. Last year I was a special education teacher for Grand Island Public Schools. I am now teaching special education at Shell Creek and Platte Center. I spend my mornings at Shell Creek with third and fourth grade students and in the afternoons I am at Platte Center with second, third and fourth grade students. I love the opportunity to meet teachers at both schools and to connect and build relationships with all the students. This past year I also coached freshman volleyball. We had a great season and I am looking forward to next year. I am so blessed to be a part of the Lakeview community and have loved teaching and coaching this past year.

The first graders enjoyed Read Across America Week, March 1-3. On Monday they got to wear their pajamas to school based on “The Sleep Book.” Tuesday was twin day. 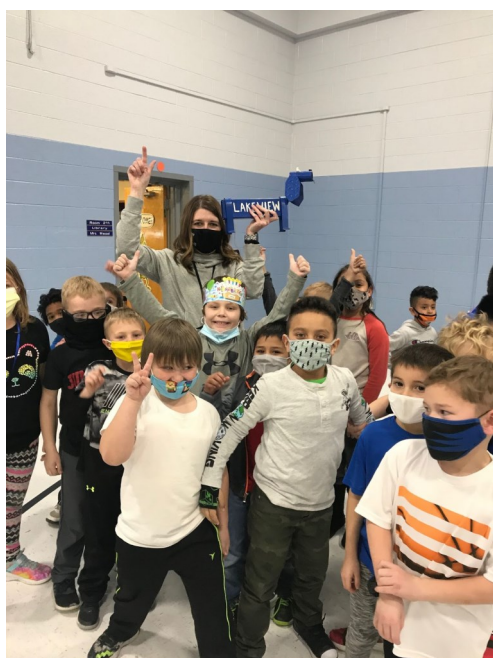
