What is Speech? What is Language?

Jorge is 4 years old. It is hard to understand him when he talks. He is quiet when he speaks, and his sounds are not clear. Vicki is in high school. She has had learning problems since she was young. She has trouble reading and writing and needs extra time to take tests. Max had a head injury. He is able to understand everything he hears and speaks in full sentences. The problem is that he has slurred speech and is hard to understand. All of these people have trouble communicating. But their problems are different.

What is Speech?

Speech is how we say sounds and words. Speech includes:

Articulation: How we make speech sounds using the mouth, lips, and tongue.

Voice: How we use our vocal fold and breath to make sounds

Fluency: This is the rhythm of our speech. We sometimes repeat sounds or pause while talking. People who do this a lot may stutter.

What is Language?

Language refers to the words we use and how we use them to share ideas and get what we want. Language includes:

*What words mean.

*How to make new words.

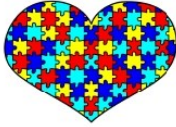
*How to put words together to make sentences.

*What we should say at different times.

Individuals can have trouble with speech, language, or both. Having trouble understanding what others say is a **receptive language disorder**. Having problems sharing our thoughts, ideas, and feelings is an **expressive language disorder**. It is possible to have both a receptive and an expressive language problem. When we have trouble saying sounds, stutter when we speak. Or have voice problems, we have a **speech disorder**.

What should you do if you feel your child has one or more of the issues above? Contact your child's teacher. The teacher will start the SAT process and if necessary, the speech-language pathologist will do an evaluation. Speech-language pathologists (SLP) work with people who have speech and language disorders. The SLP at Platte Center and Lakewiew is Sara Werner and the SLP at Shell Creek is Nancy Briggs.

April is Autism Awareness Month

Next month is Autism Awareness month. Here are some facts about Autism.

*The symbol for Autism Awareness is the puzzle piece. The puzzle piece represents the mystery and complexity of Autism. The colors (red, blue, yellow,) represents the diversity of the families and people living with autism.

*No two individuals with Autism look or act the same. It looks different for each person. Each person has different strengths and weaknesses. It can be mild or severe.

*Some people with Autism can talk and others can not. Three main challenges of Autism are communication, social skills, and repetitive behaviors. Repetitive behavior includes repetitive movements with objects, repeated body movements such as rocking and hand-flapping, or involves saying or talking about the same things over and over again. Repetitive behaviors in autism can vary radically from person to person.

*People with autism sometimes have difficulty socializing. It might be hard for them to make eye contact, ask friends questions or join in with a group. New situations with people they don't know might be very scary for someone with autism.

*When interacting with someone with Autism remember, just because they are not looking at you doesn't mean that they are not listening. When talking to them, talk to them as an equal not down to them. Be patient and be kind!

*Many people with autism feel very anxious when asked to change their routine or schedule. While changes for everyone can be annoying, for someone with autism the reaction can be very extreme and ruin their day.

*People with autism can learn, make friends, and have fun.

Mr. Bentz's 6th grade class is gearing up for the final push of the school year. It's hard to believe we are down to less than 9 weeks of school left! We have been learning about plants and animals in science class as to how they're organized and what adaptations they have. In reading we finished up our latest novel, Hatchet, and are in our 4th unit in our reading series. 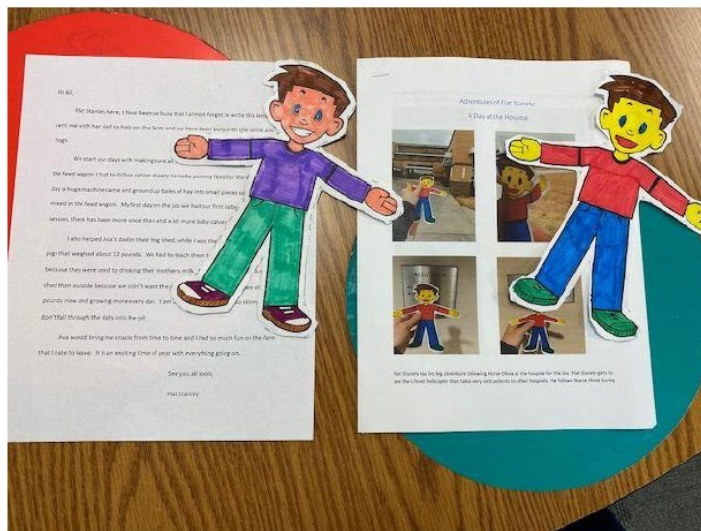
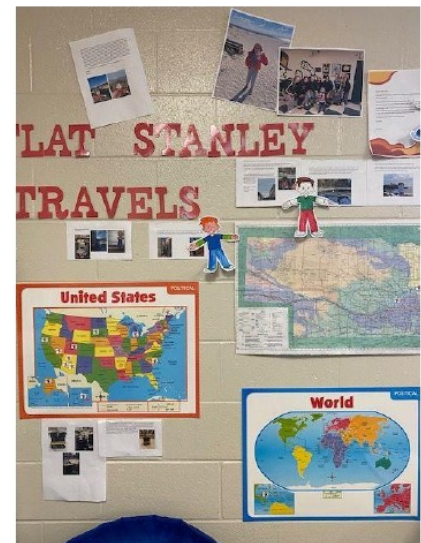
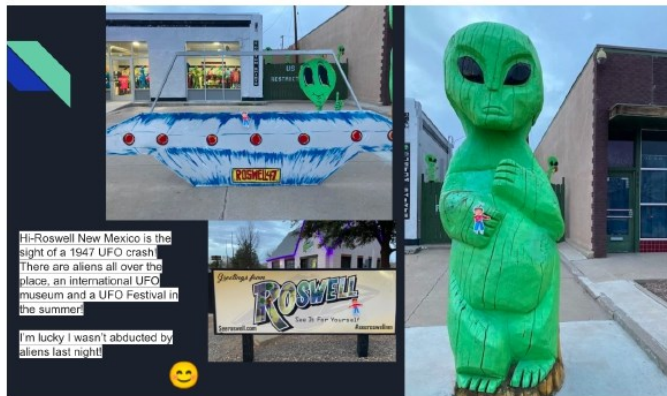
Flat Stanley

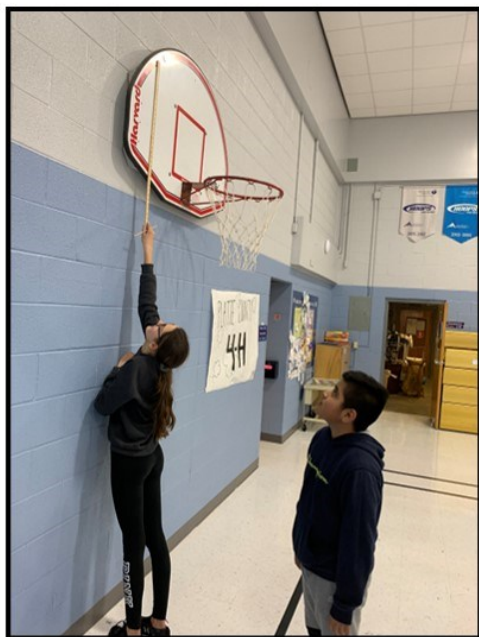
That led us into a fun geography project with him! The children brought home their own Flat Stanley to send to anyone or anyplace for a little adventure.

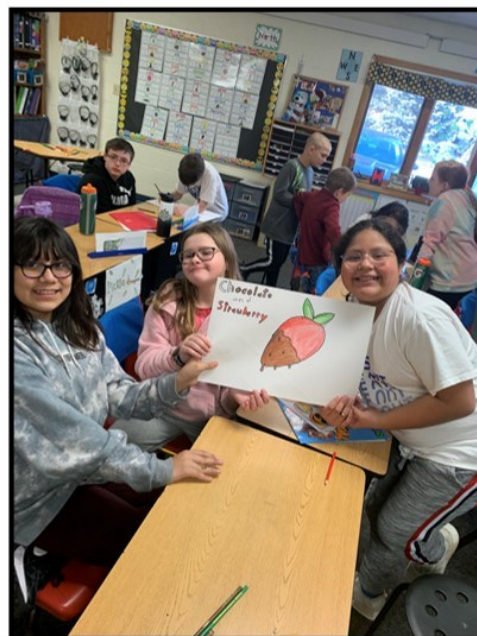




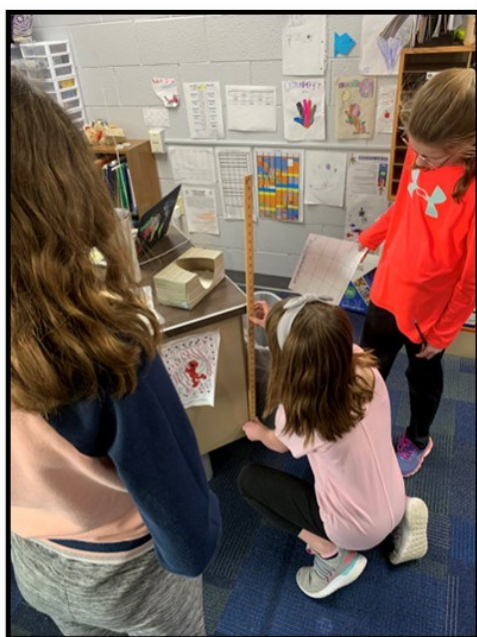

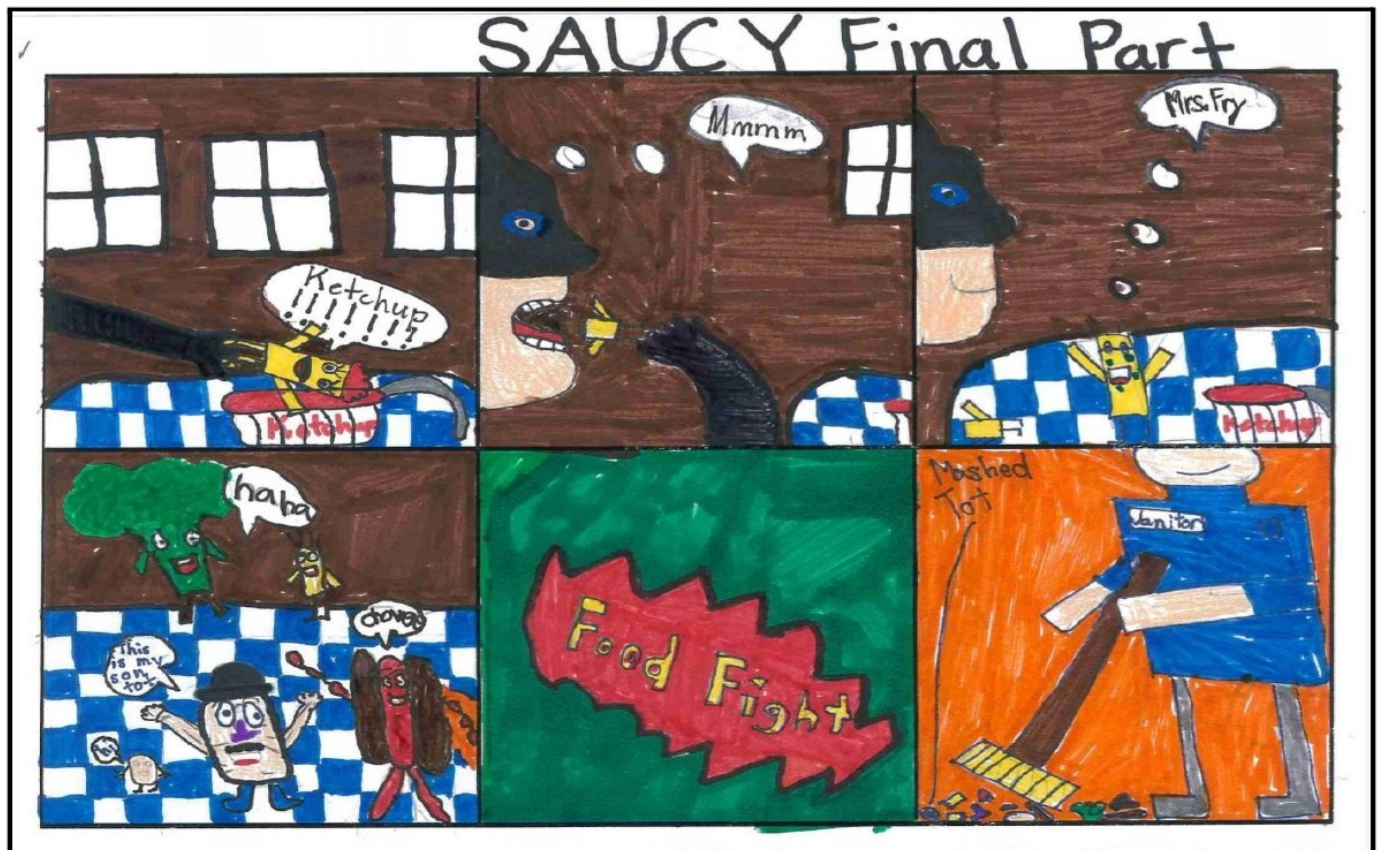
