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# From the Desk of the Superintendent

By law, public schools are mandated every five years to have an external group of educators come into the school district to assess the progress and make recommendations for improvement. These visits are referred to as the Continual School Improvement Process. During the multiple-day visit, the group will review internal assessment data, evaluate the commitment to previous goals, spend time observing schools and classrooms, and conduct interviews with several groups, including parents, students, staff, community members, and the Board of Education. At the conclusion of the visit, the external review committee will provide the district with areas they are doing well and recommendations for continual improvement goals for the next five years. This process is essentially an academic audit of the school to ensure it is working to improve and focusing on the areas of most need.

Lakeview Community Schools had their Continual School Improvement Process conducted in October. LCS was lucky enough to have nine external review members from various backgrounds including large and small schools, different roles ranging from superintendents to teachers and everything in between, and all nine with a highly regarded reputation in education. The external review committee was provided a lot of information, but a few of the highlights on progress over the last five years included:

- The student population increasing from 863 to 967
- Professional Learning Community process going from unstructured to highly functioning
- Transitioning to a higher quality reading program K-8 and teaching it with fidelity
- Moving to a district-wide K-12 one-to-one technology program
- Implementation of two preschools at both Platte Center and Shell Creek Elementary schools
- Incredible improvements to all three educational facilities

At the conclusion of the visit the external review team provides the district with both commendations and recommendations. Lakeview Community Schools proved outstanding in the following areas:

- The overall use of data
- Design of PLC process and allocation of time
- Facility improvements
- Culture of caring, community, and family
- Development of strong community partnerships
- Preparation of kids for college and careers
- Real-life application of learning
- High caliber of teachers and administrators

The recommendation for the next five years was that Lakeview Community Schools create a common vision for Tier 1 Core Instruction to provide equitable resources to close the achievement gap between various demographic groups. Potential next steps included:

- Created a more balanced assessment system
- Gather perceptual data around staff professional development
- Provide adequate time for supplementation instruction in addition to Tier One instruction
- Expand fidelity checks on all tiers of instruction
- Continually review tier two supports for students

We were excited to provide a review of all the progress made within Lakeview Community Schools over the last half-decade, and we are already beginning our mission to provide just as much progress in the next five years. The district is motivated and excited to continue our mission of striving to build a strong academic foundation with educational opportunities that develop character and the mindset needed for all students to be successful members of their community.

# 5th Grade Happenings <br> By: Mrs. Blumenthal \& Mrs. Wurdeman - 5th Grade 

1st Quarter:

-In Science students explored how organisms depend on one another and form an interconnected ecosystem. Students investigated food chains, food webs, and the importance of producers, consumers, and decomposers.
-In S.S. students reviewed the geography and regions of the United States, learned about the early people groups in the Americas (Inca, Aztec, Olmec, Maya), and looked at the different Native American tribes in North America.
-In Writing students learned about nouns, prepositions, types of sentences, proofreading sentences, and subjects and predicates.

- In Math students have reviewed and worked on foundational math skills. As we continue the year we will be building on fractions, decimals, place value, and real life story problems.
-In Reading students studied Narrative Nonfiction text and looked at how experiencing nature changes the way you think about it. We also studied Realistic Fiction and how we get the things we need. As well as Argumentative Text and the positive and negative effects of technology.Another genre studied was Informational Text and what good problem solvers do, along with a Folktale and when has a plan helped you accomplish a task, and poetry and what motivates you to accomplish a goal.
-We had an AR party for our 1st Quarter AR Achievers.

2nd Quarter:
-In Reading we will be studying Realistic Fiction and learning about different cultures. As well as Informational Text and benefits that come from people working as a group. We will also study Argumentative Text again and how we explain events that happened in the past.
-We will also be focusing on verbs in Writing class.
-We will have an AR party before Christmas break for our 2nd Quarter AR Goal Achievers.
-In Science students consider the profound importance of water as a natural resource. Students investigate the distribution of water, how it cycles through Earth's systems, and how it affects human societies. We also discuss the Dust Bowl and effects of having little to no water had on the farmers and communities during the time.
-In S.S. students learned about The Age of Exploration and started to look at how and why the first 13 colonies were established.

## Look Ahead at 3rd Quarter:

-We will be reading a novel called Esperanza Rising after Christmas break. In this novel we will be learning and studying about the Mexican Revolution, Cesar Chavez, and the California Labor Strikes.
-Students will be studying Figurative Language in Writing class.
-After Christmas, we will be shifting our focus to the topic of space in Science.
-In S.S., we will finish up learning about the 13 colonies and start diving into the causes and effects of the American Revolution.
